Saint Joseph the Worker - Saint of the Day for May 1

The Story of Saint Joseph the Worker

To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker in 1955. This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated



as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.

Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by-side in Joseph's carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. In his encyclical Laborem Exercens, Pope John Paul II stated: "the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society."

Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, "The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work."

Reflection

To capture the devotion to Saint Joseph within the Catholic liturgy, in 1870, Pope Pius IX declared Saint Joseph the patron of the universal Church. In 1955, Pope Pius XII added the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker. This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work. - Courtesy of Franciscan Media

The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

In researching this feast, it seems most likely that the Franciscans originated this feast in 1263 when St. Bonaventure recommended it for the entire Church. However, it took nearly a century for that to happen in Church history. It was originally celebrated on July 2nd but moved in 1969 to May 31st so it would fall between the Annunciation (March 25) and the Nativity of John the Baptist. This was done to harmonize it with the Gospel sequence.

In the Visitation we have two holy pregnant women together as Mary responds to Gabriel and the Holy Spirit on her mission of charity. She has been told in the Annunciation that she has been chosen and she says "yes". She then, "in haste", begins her discipleship immediately by responding to the news about Elizabeth now in her sixth month. You might find it interesting that Mary's trek from Nazareth to Ein Karem where Elizabeth lived was

about a hundred mile journey with a rise in elevation of 1,336 feet. It probably took about a week in a caravan. Mary was a strong young lady!

Besides wanting to assist Elizabeth, she probably sensed the opportunity to share her wonderment how she now had insight into God's plan and purpose for her life. And what does Elizabeth say to her? "Who am I that the Mother of my Lord should come to me? Wow!! Elizabeth had been also chosen for insight by the Holy Spirit. Think about Mary's response to Elizabeth in the Magnificat. Everything in it was about praising God, not herself. Her beautiful humility and simplicity is why she had been chosen.

Last month, in Candidacy, Article 9 we covered how Mary was chosen protectress and advocate of the Franciscan family. We are called to imitate her beautiful self giving and prayer life so we can become more Christlike ourselves. So Mary is our model for bringing Christ to others in our daily life. Don't think that it was easier for her than us. She had much she had to struggle with and suffer her whole life.

I was meditating about how as Franciscans Christ should be also growing in us. Do "we give birth to him through a holy life which must give light to others by example"? (from the Prologue) Remember, you too are chosen. As we seek to be open to God's opportunities and surprises, we can then feel the joy both Mary and Elizabeth experienced during the Visitation.

"I Am the Immaculate Conception"

The answer the Virgin Mother gave on March 25, 1858, at her 16th apparition in Lourdes to the poor 14 year old Bernadette Soubirous who asked the lady, at the request of the parish priest, what her name was. Bernadette repeated the lady's answer "I am the Immaculate Conception" all the way home so she won't forget as she never heard of the term Immaculate Conception. She was ill and missed the class when it was taught.

The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin became a dogma just 4 years prior when in 1854 Pope Pius IX solemnly proclaimed: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the savior of the human race, was <u>preserved immune</u> from all stain of original sin." However, that was not the beginning of the story. It started many centuries before. Never the less, this dogma was confirmed from above by none other than the Blessed Virgin Mary.



That Mary was "preserved immune" from original sin (Catechism of the Catholic Church) made me imagine original sin as an ancient Virus that copied itself into the DNA of Adam, and was passed down from generation to generation. One could draw an analogy, that baptism protects us from the affect of original sin like a highly effective vaccine protects against a deadly virus. And Christ is the antidote or the antibody that saves us. Baptism is after birth, but Mary was immune at her conception.



According to the catechism, original sin is a "deprivation of original holiness and justice". "Human nature is wounded in the natural powers proper to it: subject to ignorance, suffering and the dominion of death". We are "inclined to sin". Mary is an exception. She had to be free of inclination to sin from the moment of her conception to become Mother of God. Her conception was immaculate through divine grace so she could become Christ bearer, in Greek "Christotokos", that is Mother of Christ, the Ark of the New Covenant.

The idea that Mary was free of the stain of

original sin (a term used first by St. Augustin in the 5th century) was not accepted early on. Even St. Thomas of Aquinas in the 13th century did not believe that Mary was conceived without the stain of original sin. While it was thought appropriate that Mary was immaculately conceived, the issue for the Church was how to resolve the problem that only with Christ's death would the stain of original sin be removed. It took two Franciscans, William of Ware and John Duns Scotus, to develop the theology that was then accepted by the Church.

John Duns Scotus argued that Mary's immaculate conception enhances Jesus redemptive work. Mary's privilege was the result of God's grace and not any intrinsic merit on her part. A gradual acceptance of the Franciscan's views over the next several centuries was reflected in the teaching of various popes (especially Sixtus IV in the late 15th century) and the councils of Basel (1439) and Trent (1546). It was not, however, until December 8, 1854, that Pius IX, urged by the majority of Catholic bishops throughout the world, solemnly declared in the bull *Ineffabilis Deus* that the doctrine was revealed by God and hence was to be firmly believed as such by all Catholics.

In Luke's Gospel (1:28), the Angel Gabriel, speaking on God's behalf, salutes Mary as "Full of Grace". This is before the Holy Spirit comes upon her to conceive Christ. This phrase means that Mary has the grace necessary for the task ahead.

It struck me that the divine revelation of Mary's Immaculate Conception at Lourdes comes after the Church has officially concluded this truth and declared it in a papal bull. God is patient, he wants us to arrive on our own to the truth rather than spoon feeding us. God respects our freedom of choice, and treats us as adults.

If you ever been to Lourdes, you know what a beautiful place it is, and how prayerful is the atmosphere. Here is a picture for you.

Biodegradable Laundry Detergent

Once you've seen soap suds at the seashore, commercial laundry detergents don't seem so innocent. This recipe offers a completely biodegradable alternative:

- Use 2 Tablespoons <u>Sal Suds</u>* per load just like you would a regular laundry detergent
- Optional: Add 2 Tablespoons washing soda or 1/4 cup baking soda for an extra boost

All-Purpose, Sanitizing Cleaner

Tea tree oil is the secret ingredient for this cleaner that sanitizes surfaces. It contains no chemicals to harm people or pets, and is really easy to put together.

- Put 20 drops tea tree oil*, 3/4 cup water, and a 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar in a spray bottle.
- Shake well to combine
- Spray the cleaner directly onto surfaces, then wipe clean with a dry cloth.

NOTE: Shaking before each use will prevent the ingredients from separating

DIY Bathroom Cleaner

For a bathroom cleaner for the tub or shower <u>AND</u> the tile floors, do this:

fill a jar with 1.5 cups of baking soda,

- 1/2 cup of warm water,
- 1/2 cup of liquid soap (such as Dawn), and
- 2 tablespoons of white distilled vinegar.

For *really* grimy grout, add a touch of lemon juice.

Window and Glass Cleaner

Cornstarch is the key to this streak-free clean! Pour one cup of hot water and one cup of rubbing alcohol in a large bowl. Whisk in four tablespoons of cornstarch and transfer the to a spray bottle. Simply spritz on windows, mirrors, or glass and wipe clean with a microfiber cloth.

- * Sal Suds is available at Walmart, Amazon & Co-Op Markets
- * <u>Tea Tree Oil</u>, in addition to its use as a sanitizer, is used in medicine to treat fungus, acne, dandruff and minor skin irritations. It's widely available under many brand names.
