From our **National** Minister

Dear Sisters and Brothers, May the Lord give you peace.

We have just received a letter from our Minister General regarding the Coronavirus (*This mailing is the 'attachment'*). Please read it and distribute widely. We will also share this letter via our website. I am thankful for Tibor's approach which calls us to both prayer and action, and sets the proper tone for us as Secular Franciscans facing these unusual times.

At the national level we have received questions about whether to cancel or postpone Regional gatherings. We have no set policy at the national level but beg all to be properly informed and make wise decisions as a Council. Check local health directives and look at what the CDC says, and evaluate from there. None of us want to cancel things we have planned, but we need to carefully consider if we are putting folks at risk or contributing to the spread of this virus.

Are we safe if it is a smaller gathering? Or if everyone commits to exercising the recommended disciplines? I don't have the answer to these, or to other questions. We might need to consider the facility where we might be meeting, and consider who has traveled somewhere recently who might be a carrier. We should not be driven by fear, but we do need good common sense and caution, given the current environment. There are alternatives such as rescheduling, or meeting by webinar or conference call.

The National Executive Council joins you in prayer during this time. Let us remember who we are, and be guided by the Holy Spirit in our prayers and actions. Living our theme for this year, let us continue to journey together in love and compassion.

Social Distancing

Please listen to requests by health authorities to practice '**Social Distancing**.' Please take this *very* seriously. Staying isolated even if you feel well is an act of altruism* for others. If at all possible, for anything other than medical emergencies, you may want to **stay home**. If you must go out, maintain physical distance from others. And of course, we need to wash our hands, exceptionally well. ... I just checked my email and found that tonight, on March 15, Governor Newsom announced home isolation for seniors 65+. Which leads me too the next topic...

How are you on groceries & other necessities? Please reach out to grown kids or grandkids, or friends to help with groceries; they can drop them at the door without you even needing to open it. Wave and blow them a kiss through the window. Another option is online delivery for your groceries (Aldi, Von's, Albertson's, Stater Brother's, etc.) and medicines (CVS, Walgreen's). Reach out to your kids, grandkids, or friends if you need help setting up your account. They can do that for you online with you on the phone even if they live far away. Or if needed, call *me* (my cell phone is in our roster) and I will help you set up an account for online delivery and help you with your order. Avoiding the gym this weekend (social distancing), I spent a lot of time out on nature walks with my little dog, Odie. When anyone approached, I'd get off the trail into the brush to keep a nice 15ft+ distance between us. One family, mistaking my distance for fear of their big dog, assured me their dog was friendly. I replied that I was 'social distancing.' Seeing their confused looks, I called over, saying, 'Out of love and respect for you and your family, I'm keeping a safe social distance.' Their incredulous expressions betrayed that they really just wanted to avoid the crazy lady in the tall wet weeds with legs splattered in mud as they hurried on... but then paused... Dad's expression lit up with sudden understanding. With a big, appreciative smile and a wave, yelled back, 'Hey!!! THANKS!!!!'

While praying on my eight mile walk Sunday morning, <u>Sr. Marianne Cope</u>, a Franciscan sister who ministered to the lepers in Hawaii, came to mind. As a hospital administrator in New York, She met with resistance when she insisted that doctors **wash their hands** between patients. When she and six of her sisters left New York for Hawaii, so great was her faith in God, that she promised her sisters that none would contract leprosy if they joined her. She insisted in abject cleanliness and thorough **handwashing** frequently and throughout the day, with every patient. Mother Marianne's promise held true as none of her sisters ever contracted the disease. Let us all ask Sr. Marianne to pray for us – as we emulate her example... in trusting God, in prayer, in caring for others – and in washing our hands.



Social Connection is important, too

The fraternity is a conduit of God's grace, and it's important that we stay connected. I ask that until we meet again, let's stay in touch with each other. Reflections on Uncertainty

Over the last days and weeks our world has undergone a lot. At this moment, we have been asked to "self-isolate." For many this term brings visions of loneliness and fear. Many have likened our current situation to that of the Jews entering the desert, uncertain, fearful of the future. As Viktor Frankl demonstrates in his book, *Man's Search for Meaning*, it seems that we can endure almost anything if it has, or more importantly, if we find meaning. As Secular Franciscans, we seem to have an advantage, in that we do seek and find meaning. Still, the unknown can be anxiety-provoking.

How do we manage the anxiety of the unknown? First, it's important to acknowledge that the current situation can be disconcerting, and that feeling the stress of the situation is normal and not an indication of emotional weakness or lack of faith. We are "wired" to respond to emergency situations with increased energy and focus. With so much unknown, it can be difficult to find the focus, and we are left with the unfocused energy of anxiety. Once we recognize that, we can take steps to address the stress and reduce the associated anxiety.

Here are some useful ways to manage anxiety and increase focus:

- 1. Notice the anxiety. Recognize it for what it is, and let it move on.
- 2. Center yourself. Become mindful. Pray. Meditate. Contemplate.
- 3. Recreate. Allow yourself to play and pursue your hobbies.
- 4. Connect. Call friends and family and remember that they need you as much as you need them.

It can be beneficial to seek outside and support, and sometimes just a listening ear helps. The San Diego Diocese has established the Mental Health Ministry https://www.sdcatholic.org/office-for/family-life-and-spirituality/mental-health-ministry/ with corresponding ministry groups in several parishes. Members of this ministry offer spiritual companioning, mindful presence, education, and referrals to resources. To reach the Mental Health Ministry at the Mission San Luis Rey Parish, call 760-547-0751. The Mental Health Ministry is open to everyone - you do not need to be a Mission parishioner to access this ministry.



I saw this picture in "Bing" images, and every Lent when I look at it, it seems that Jesus is saying, "I love You so much that I did this for You, don't worry about everybody else, as I did it for them as well. Just remember, I went through my Sacred Passion for YOU." To which I respond, thank you Jesus, I love you Jesus.

I have no idea who painted it, but this is what He looked like, not like the 'sanitized' crucifixes in our churches. We have to remember that His Passion was not glamourous and painless as so many artists make it appear.

I'm sorry if this grosses you out, but this is what we remember on Good Friday. See following excerpt from "The 24 Hours of the Passion Of Our Lord Jesus Christ," by Luisa Piccarreta,

Seventeenth Hour

From 9 to 10 AM

Jesus is crowned with thorns. Presented to the people: "Ecce Homo!"

Jesus is condemned to death

My Jesus, infinite Love, the more I look at You, the more I understand how much You suffer. You are already completely lacerated – there is not one point left whole in You. The executioners, enraged in seeing that, in so many pains, You look at them with so much love; and in seeing that your loving gaze, forming a sweet enchantment, almost like many voices, prays and supplicates for more pains and new pains - though inhuman, yet forced by your love, make You stand on your feet. Unable to stand Yourself, You fall again into your own Blood, and, irritated, with kicks and shoves, they make You reach the place where they will crown You with thorns.

My Love, if You do not sustain me with your gaze of love, I cannot go on seeing You suffer. I feel a shiver in my bones, my heart throbs, I feel I am dying. Jesus, Jesus – help me!

And my lovable Jesus says to me: "My child, courage, do not miss anything of what I suffered. Be attentive to my teachings. I have to redo man in everything. Sin has removed the crown from him, and has crowned him with opprobrium and with confusion; so he cannot stand before my Majesty. Sin has dishonored him, making him lose any right to honors and to glory. This is why I want to be crowned with thorns – to place the crown on man's forehead, and to return to him all rights to every honor and glory. Before my Father, my thorns will be reparations and voices of defense for many sins of thought, especially pride; and for each created mind they will be voices of light and supplication, that they may not offend Me. Therefore, unite yourself to Me, and pray and repair together with Me."

Crowned Jesus, your cruel enemies make You sit; they place a rag of purple on You, they take the crown of thorns, and with infernal fury, they put it on your adorable head. Then, by blow of rod, they make the thorns penetrate into your forehead, and some of them reach into your eyes, into your ears, into your skull, and even behind your neck. My Love, what torment, what unspeakable pains! How many cruel deaths You suffer!

Your Blood pours down upon your Face, in such a way that one can see nothing but blood. But under those thorns and that Blood, your most holy Face appears, radiant with sweetness, with peace, and with love. And the executioners, wanting to complete the tragedy, blindfold You, place a reed in your hand as scepter, and begin their mockeries. They hail You King of the Jews, they beat You on the crown, they slap You, and say to You: "Guess who hit You!"

And You remain silent – You answer by repairing for the ambition of those who aspire to kingdoms, to dignities, to honors, and for those who, finding themselves in positions of authority and behaving incorrectly, cause the ruin of the peoples and of their souls, which had been entrusted to them; and their evil examples push others toward evil and cause the loss of souls.

With this reed You hold in your hand, You repair for so many works - good, but empty of interior spirit and also done with evil intentions. In the insults and the blindfold, You repair for those who ridicule the holiest things, discrediting them and profaning them; You also repair for those who blindfold the sight of their intelligence in order not to see the light of Truth. With this blindfold, You impetrate that the blindfolds of passions, of riches and of pleasures may be removed from us.

My King Jesus, your enemies continue with their insults. The Blood which flows from your most holy head is so much, that reaching your mouth, It prevents You from letting me hear clearly your most sweet voice, so I cannot do what You do. Therefore I come into your arms; I want to sustain your pierced and suffering head, and I want to place my head under those thorns in order to feel their pricks.

But as I say this, my Jesus calls me with His loving gaze, and quickly I embrace His Heart, and I try to sustain His head. Oh, how beautiful it is to be with Jesus, even in the midst of a thousand torments! And He says to me: "My child, these thorns say that I want to be constituted King of each heart; to Me belongs every dominion. Take these thorns and prick your heart; let everything that does not belong to Me come out, and then leave one thorn inside, as the seal that I am your King, and to prevent any other thing from entering into you. Then, go through every heart, and pricking them, let all the fumes of pride and the rottenness which they contain come out, and constitute Me King of all."

My Love, my heart breaks in leaving You; therefore I pray You to deafen my ears with your thorns, that I may hear only your voice; cover my eyes with your thorns, that I may look at You alone; fill my mouth with your thorns, that my tongue be mute to everything that may offend You, and be free to praise You and bless You in everything. O my King Jesus, surround me with thorns, that they may hold me in custody, defend me, and keep me all intent on You. And now I want to dry your Blood and kiss You, because I see that your enemies take You to Pilate, who will condemn You to death. My Love, help me to follow your Sorrowful Way, and bless me.

Sister Death

Retired Bishop Gilberto Chávez dies

National pioneer in Hispanic ministry was revered leader in San Diego region

SAN DIEGO – The Most Rev. Robert McElroy, Roman Catholic bishop of San Diego, announced the death today of retired Auxiliary Bishop Gilberto Chávez, at age 87, a revered spiritual leader of Catholics across the region, particularly Latinos. He died Sunday (March 15) at a local retirement home after months of hospice care due to failing health.

Bishop Chávez served the San Diego Diocese for 60 years, 46 of them as auxiliary bishop. During this era, the San Diego region's population grew rapidly, particularly among Hispanics. Bishop Chávez championed initiatives both at the diocese and in the broader U.S. Catholic Church to serve Latinos, particularly with Spanish-language ministry.

He tirelessly encouraged parishioners to develop their spiritual formation and their leadership skills. He inspired generations of Latino Catholics to take leadership roles in their parishes, in their communities and in public life.

"The extraordinary gifts Bishop Chávez blessed us with during his lifetime profoundly shaped our faithful, our clergy, our diocese and our Church itself," Bishop McElroy said.

Bishop Chávez launched pioneering programs to represent Latino Catholics in San Diego and Imperial counties, including training in Spanish. He headed the diocese's first commission to serve Hispanic Catholics, an organization that continues its work today, when Latinos comprise nearly two-thirds of the 1.3 million Catholics at the diocese.

He served in nine parishes, including his first assignment at Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish in Riverside in 1960, his first of two assignments in the Our Lady of Mount Carmel in San Ysidro in 1971, and as rector for 24 years at St. Joseph's Cathedral.

Though Bishop Chávez retired in June of 2007 at age 75, he continued to be active until recently. He offered friendship and counsel to priests, particularly newly ordained ones. And he attended major events, including the ordination in 2017 of Auxiliary Bishop John Dolan, who as an eighth-grader was confirmed by Bishop Chávez.

Bishop Chavéz always attended celebrations of the faithful. In December of 2017, he attended the annual Our Lady of Guadalupe Mass at the Community Concourse, where he received a standing ovation to the chants of "¡Que Viva el Obispo Chávez!"

"I want to congratulate you for being faithful to the Catholic Church," he told the several thousand who gathered that day, "for choosing the path toward good, truth, humility, and love. You are all important to the Church and to society as a whole."

He was born Gilberto Espinoza Chávez on May 9, 1932, in Ontario, Calif., one of six children in a devoutly Catholic family that had emigrated from Mexico.

After high school, he entered the seminary in San Diego and was ordained in 1960 by Bishop Charles F. Buddy. He served in various assignments across Southern California, including a four-year stint as chaplain at a state drug and rehabilitation center in Norco.

While working in the prison system, he decided to pursue a college degree from UC Riverside to better prepare him for challenges to come.

Pope Paul VI named him auxiliary bishop in 1974, only the second Hispanic bishop at the time in the nation. He served first with Bishop Leo T. Maher and later with Bishop Robert H. Brom, a total of 33 years.

Beyond the diocese, Bishop Chávez actively supported community causes from Oceanside to El Centro, particularly those that advocated for social justice for the poor and disenfranchised. He once marched alongside César Chávez from the border to San Diego to support rights for farmworkers. The bishop inspired a generation of young activists who would go on to lead organizations in the private and public sectors.

In 1983, he became rector of St. Joseph's Cathedral, where he served for 24 years until he retired as bishop in 2007.

He had requested a public fiesta be held in San Ysidro to celebrate his life. That celebration will be held after the COVID-19 crisis has ended. Courtesy "*The Southern Cross*" Diocesan Newspaper.

- and will continue to do so.




Be Aware!!!
