

Karron's Korner - Welcome to January

Blessed Angela of Foligno

Some saints show signs of holiness very early. Not Angela! Born into a prominent family in Foligno near Assisi in 1248, Angela wanted wealth and social position. Her superficiality continued well into marriage and motherhood. At forty, she saw the emptiness of her life and sought God's help in the Sacrament of Penance. A Franciscan confessor advised her to seek God's pardon and to dedicate herself to prayer and works of charity. When she realized she was priceless since God created and loves her, she became a penitent and worked among the poor. Shortly after her conversion, death took Angela's husband and children.

Selling her possessions, Angela entered the Secular Franciscan Order. She served the poor of Foligno as a nurse and begged for their needs. Eventually, she established a community of women who adopted the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order and added three additional vows. A mystic, Angela related the story of her conversion in the "Book of Visions and Instructions" dictated to her confessor. Angela died in 1309 and was beatified in 1693.
