

Formation is our focus

As Secular Franciscans, we will begin evangelizing in our own parishes by distributing a new quality brochure on what it means to be an SFO. Our 'sometimes using words' happens when we answer phone queries from people who respond to these booklet invitations about "going from gospel to life and life to the gospel."

Our own new ongoing formation will lead up to this opportunity of expressing our faith to others. New assortments of tools are being added.

Eileen C, our formation director, has developed a course, which includes on-line videos conducted by Fr. Franklin Fong, OFM. They will be taught in the tradition of the First Order.

Among the material being covered is 'why religious orders are formed.' Small group discussions along with new speakers are all part of this preparation to live more fully our Franciscan family lives. Fr. Kenan Osborne, OFM, Br. Bill Short, OFM and the pope's encyclical on evangelization are included in this program to build our confidence about our faith and our order.

Much of what we will do was described by one of the council members as being the cause of our 'radical life changes.' "It is the world versus the Secular Franciscan Order," Scott H. "It is living significantly different." "Who wants to be a nobody?" said David Y

"We are learning to preach the gospel in a different way. " Scott concluded.

by Brother Ugolino – Translated by Raphael Brown How Brother Juniper Kept Silent for Six Months

By nature this servant of God had little patience when something was done or said to him. But he made such strong efforts to control himself that with the grace of God he acquired that virtue in a short time.

Seeing therefore that he could not remain silent and refrain from answering when something unpleasant was said to him or when he was scolded, once, realizing that his tongue was doing him much harm, he decided to remain silent at all cost. And he arranged it this way in order to observe it better: on the first day he kept silent out of love for the Heavenly Father, the second day for love of Jesus Christ, the next for love of the Holy Spirit, the next for love of the Virgin Mary, the next for love of our Father St. Francis, and so on. Every day for love of some Saint, he remained silent and did not speak for six months. And although he suffered pain and anxiety within, nevertheless externally he forced himself not to reply, even though with great difficulty.

Now one time it happened that certain words were said that were extremely hard for him to bear, and he made such a violent physical effort and his suffering and violence were so great that blood gushed from his chest and he spat it out of his mouth.

On seeing it, Brother Juniper grieved intensely and went into the church before the crucifix, and there he devoutly complained and mourned over the great suffering and pain that he was enduring. And he said: "See, my Lord, what I was bearing for love of you!"

Then the Crucified Christ miraculously raised His right hand from the wood of the cross, where it was nailed, and laid it on the wound in His side and said: "And I—what am I bearing for you?"

And Brother Juniper was utterly amazed and frightened and shocked to the core of his being. And he felt such emotion in his soul and mind that from that moment he was changed into another man. For just as formerly he could not endure the least painful word without suffering, so henceforth, with the help of divine grace, he not only bore with joy the insults and offenses that were said or done to him, but he went out hunting for them as for precious stones for his soul. To the glory of Christ. Amen.


Saint Colette (Feast Day March 6)

Nicolette Boilet, called Colette, was the daughter of Robert Boilet, the carpenter of the famous Benedictine Abbey of Corbie; her mother's name was Marguerite Moyon. Her parents were near 60 at her birth. Orphaned at age 17, she was left in the care of a Benedictine abbot. Her guardian wanted her to marry, but Colette was drawn to religious life. She initially tried to join the Beguines and Benedictines, but failed in

her vocation. As a Franciscan tertiary she became a Hermitess. On 17 September 1402, at age 21, she became an anchoress - walled into a cell whose only opening was a grilled window into a church.

She had visions in which Saint Francis of Assisi ordered her to restore the Rule of Saint Clare to its original severity. When she hesitated, she was struck blind for three days and mute for three more; she saw this as a sign to take action.

Colette tried to follow her mission by explaining it, but had no success. Realizing she needed more authority behind her words, she walked to Nice, France, barefoot and clothed in a habit of patches, to meet Peter de Luna, acknowledged by the French as the schismatic Pope Benedict XIII. He professed her a Poor Clare, and was so impressed that he made her



superioress of all convents of Minoresses that she might reform or found, and a missioner to Franciscan friars and tertiaries.

She travelled from convent to convent, meeting opposition, abuse, slander, and was even accused of sorcery. Eventually she made some progress, especially in Savoy, where her reform gained sympathizers and recruits. This reform passed to Burgundy in France, Flanders in Belgium and Spain.

Colette helped Saint Vincent Ferrer heal the papal schism. She founded seventeen convents; one branch of the Poor Clares is still known as the *Colettines*. She was known for a deep devotion to Christ's Passion with an appreciation and care for animals. Colette fasted every Friday, meditating on the Passion. After receiving Holy Communion, she would fall into ecstasies for hours. She foretold the date of her own death.

The Colettine Sisters are found today, outside of France, in Belgium, Germany, Spain, England, and the United States


