




Ivo of Brittary (III)

St. Ives, born at Kermartin, near Tréguier, Brittany, 17 October, 1253; died at Louannee, 19 May, 1303, was the son of Helori, lord of Kermartin, and Azo du Kenquis. In 1267 Ives was sent to the University of Paris, where he graduated in civil law. He went to Orléans in 1277 to study canon law. On his return to Brittany having received minor orders he was appointed "official", or ecclesiastical judge, of the archdeanery of Rennes (1280); meanwhile he studied Scripture, and there are strong reasons for holding that he joined the Franciscan Tertiaries (OFS) sometime later at Guingamp. He was soon invited by the Bishop of Tréguier to become his "official", and accepted the offer (1284). He displayed great zeal and rectitude in the discharge of his duty and did not hesitate to resist the unjust taxation of the king, which he considered an encroachment on the rights of the Church; by his charity he gained the title of advocate and patron of the poor. Having been ordained he was appointed to the parish of Tredrez in 1285 and eight years later to Louannee, where he died. He was buried in Tréguier, and was canonized in 1347 by Clement VI, his feast being kept on 19 May. He is the patron of lawyers, though not, it is said, their model, for — "Sanctus Ivo erat Brito, Advocatus et non latro, Res miranda populo." (from Catholic Encyclopedia Online Edition © 2003 by K. This young man, who would always ask the most interesting questions and gave the best comments, was David. David was only fourteen years old and was attending RCIA for Confirmation. He raised his hand and said, "I have learned not to be afraid of death." I was stunned at his answer and said to the rest of the class, "He gets it!"

With sadness we must inform you of the sudden death of Elaine Smith on Monday, <u>April 2, 2012.</u> Cynthia Mattacheck, Elaine's friend, found her body

sitting in her chair at home, apparently only a few hours after death. It seems she died very peacefully, a great gift of God's love. A lingering death in a hospital or nursing home would have been extremely painful for Elaine. Cynthia runs a home for the elderly near Elaine's house and for about the last 13 years or so, except for the last year, Elaine came over to eat dinner daily with Cynthia's residents. Those of you who knew Elaine, knew that she was very independent, and when Cynthia was not able to allow Elaine to keep her dog under the table when she ate with the others, Elaine stopped coming, except occasionally. Because Elaine got to know Cynthia's children, though, she always came over to celebrate holidays and feast days with Cynthia's family.

We all knew that Elaine loved animals, especially Aragon, her

beloved German Shepherd Companion Dog, 'Aragon' who accompanied Elaine to our meetings. We thought Elaine called him Eric, but perhaps we were interpreting that for Arag, a shortened version of his registered name. What we didn't know is that Therapy Dogs International (http://tdi-dog.org) was founded by Elaine in New Jersey in 1976. Elaine has remained in contact with the organization all through the years. We knew that Elaine took care of many animals at her home, but she never shared with us how many there were. When Elaine died, Animal Control had to come over to take charge of 5 goats, 10 chickens, 6 cats, 3 dogs, 15 birds, and several rabbits. Elaine fed and cared for her animals first, before she bothered to take care of herself and the animals were in very good health and condition when she died.

Elaine was born on May 13, 1930, (almost 83) in Newark, New Jersey. Her parents, though not Catholic, sent Elaine to Catholic schools. Sometime during her youth, she became a Catholic, and then a Secular Franciscan. She made her profession on November 23, 1947, at St Francis of Assisi Church in New York City. She became a nurse, but her real passion was animals. We don't know when she moved to California, but she came to the San Luis Rey Fraternity in 1995. Because she had no living relatives, being an only child, and left no written instructions as far as is known, the state has to step in and take care of her estate. She'd always told Cynthia that she wanted to be cremated and her ashes buried with her parents in New Jersey. The state will do that, and the officials at Therapy Dogs International will take care of arrangements in New Jersey. St. Peter's Community in Fallbrook was quite active in Elaine's care through the years, even though she was very resistant to cutting down on the number of animals in her home. Cynthia will arrange for a Memorial Mass at St. Peter's when she receives the ashes, and will let us know when it will be so we can participate in saying good-bye.

May the souls of the faithfully departed, and especially Elane's, through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.
