A few words from our Minister ...

Just a little bit more than a year ago, my wife Juliet and I watched as several severely overweight women struggled, but finished running their first half marathon. Something the broader base of society is simply inclined to believe "can't be done". The next morning, Juliet stood emotional in our kitchen, looked at me and said, "Those women, what they accomplished, what's my excuse?" She got up the next morning, and ran a mile. Something she had never done before.

A few weeks ago, I ran alongside her on a training day. After about 2 hours, she looked at me and said, "My body hurts so bad, but my mind right now is so clear!" I smiled happily at her and said, "That's suffering!"

Notably, athletes refer to this phenomenon as a "Runners High". However, this type of endorphin rush can teach us a valuable lesson as Christians. That is, never be afraid to carry the Cross. Invariably when I think about the worst times of my life, upon reflection, I realized there was good reason as to why they were the BEST moments of my life. And each of those great moments was a direct result of having overcome the bad ones.

In the life of Christ, He emerged from the desert and brought us the Beatitudes. From the Cross, He brought us to Salvation. Lent gives us an opportunity to meditate upon: 'Out of suffering, comes an even greater joy!' Each day, many will yearn for that mountain top experience with El Shaddai. But if we wish to commune with the God of the Mountains, we first need to be willing to climb up a pretty big hill!


