Beautiful Prayers and thoughts from our General Minister, Tibor Kauser OFS

I invite you all to open our eves, our ears and our hearts, so that we can receive the Spirit of God, the Holy Spirit, who is to fill us, to console us, and to lead us individually, in our families and in the fraternities. It is the Holy Spirit, who fills us with life, without Him we would not have life. Because of Him we can live our vocation, can live our family lives, and our lives in the fraternity. Let us always be fully aware of this and live "the dignity and freedom of the sons of God, in whose hearts the Holy Spirit dwells as in His temple." Page 1, General Minister's letter of June 4, 2017

This letter has many beautiful gems in it, to include:

"It is not good for the man to be alone." "No man is an island." (T. Merton) we seculars live in our families, our fraternities, our working teams, in our parish communities... to celebrate and to spread his love.

Family Life: The most important community, ... is our family. Our families, as being domestic churches, have to be places of prayer, ... (our children learn from our example...Editor).

Fraternities: Our fraternities – particularly our local fraternities – are the places, where we can live our vocation, where we can find the source of life, by accepting, living and giving the love of God. ... We have to take the risk of being opened, we have to take the risk of the conflicts. ... There is no real fraternity without reconciliation. ... He wants us to life (live) a vivid life, that brings (bears) fruits.

In the ecclesial community: It is particularly our duty, as secular Franciscans, to bring our spirituality into the parish communities, ... with an attitude that respects and strives for the care of creation in all our activities, with an intention to focus the parish life on the poorest and the most needy inside, but also outside the members of its community.

In the society:

Each secular Franciscan is a citizen of a certain country. ... It is our responsibility, and a part of our vocation to strive to form part of our society always in a better way, in the spirit of service, ... We have to seek the good of all, particularly in the service of the smallest, the poorest, the most marginalized, ... it is also a part of our vocation to bring the Holy Spirit where civil liberty or religious freedom is misunderstood, ... for the care of creation or for the protection of life, ...

2. How to manage an order

Here are some questions that we all should look at closely... remember that our General Minister is talking to everybody, not just the leadership of the fraternities.

What is the Order, who is the Order? We are the Order, we all, sisters and brothers, all over the world, who want to live the Gospel in the manner of St. Francis. (Holy Rule para. 2)

Management has to be a common management at all levels. ...

We have to learn from God and from each other, how to deal not only with the 'heavenly' things, like prayer life, sacramental life, devotions, but also with the 'earthly things, like organizing meetings, give(ing) proper formation, improve(ing) communication.

Each and every one of us will be the instrument of God towards the others.

..." the General Minister of the Order is the Holy Spirit." (St. Francis)

Next year we celebrate the 40th anniversary of the renewed Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order. ... We have to make it a living thing. ... "Study, love and live your Rule, because its values are truly evangelical ones." (St. JPII, sept 27, 1982) It has to be a part of our formation, to read often and to study the basic document of our life. It has to be a part of our life, a daily nutrition.

3. "... filled day by day with the comfort and grace of the Holy Spirit" (1Cel XI 26)

What does it mean to be filled with the comfort and grace of the Holy Spirit? Do we really recognize, how much less we could live (do) without Him?

My dear sisters and brothers, we need to be filled by the Holy Spirit.

"By that Spirit, whom Jesus gave to the disciples when they were gathered. By that Spirit, who filled the disciples when they were together with they were together with many and proclaimed the good news.

By that Spirit, who has made the Church form a group of weak and uneducated persons.

By that Spirit, that likewise makes of us what we can call 'fraternity', and makes of us an Order.

Let us open us to the Holy Spirit so that He can fill us and make of us a true fraternity! Let Him fill our assembly, too, when we celebrate our General Chapter!"

Come, Holy Spirit, come! Fill us, day by day, with your comfort and your grace!

This all over our General Minister's signature and seal. Pentecost, 2017

Leadership Training Reflections

From Dick:

What drew you to take the class?

Initially I thought the class was for people interested in learning about being a spiritual assistant and I didn't think that was my calling. At the Malibu retreat in May, Sylvia presented the class as leadership training and challenged everyone there, that as Secular Franciscans we are all called to be open to leadership within our fraternities. So even though I think the leadership of our fraternity is excellent and I don't harbor any aspirations to be in leadership, I realized I need to be open and thus I should consider this opportunity to learn more about our order.

Name one new idea, concept, or term you learned in your first class.

The key takeaway for me was re-emphasizing the need for ongoing formation for all seculars. It doesn't end at profession and this focus has really been a key part of the recent revisions since the Second Vatican Council and our new rule in 1978. Lay people are being challenged to take a more active role in our Church and as Seculars we should be leading the way!

From Diane:

What drew you to take the class?

During the years we were snowbirds in Oxnard we attended Bonaventure Fraternity in Ventura, The Journey and SA Formats were introduced in those months. At that time it was a Saturday for many months in LA. We were not able to ask admittance. When this series once again appeared we asked permission. I participated in the correspondence Course with Fr. John dePaemelare using Family Connection shortly after my profession as a means of on going formation with the intention of one day serving my community. It was clear to me that this program would fill in gaps that might have existed in a correspondence course and would put me in alignment with this regions form of formation for its leaders.

Name one new idea, concept, or term you learned in your first class.

I found my learning and internalizing information is greatly enhanced by the format used on the June weekend. A brief intro to the topic with having copies of information being present given for us to follow. We were then paired off for sharing. I found this way of internalizing information met many area of learning using all my senses. I learned things about the person I was paired with, another perspective of information shared, and opportunity to

share points we found important in the presentation. We were all given advance information to assist us in being prepared for what was on the lesson plan as well.

From Carol:

What drew you to take the class?

I also thought it was about fraternity leadership, and wanted to learn more about being a servant leader in our Fraternity..., but found out that it is about leadership in our holy church through our parish ministries, and assisting our pastor(s) in their duties in the parish and the world, not just in our Fraternities. Our primary job is to lead others to Jesus through our lifestyle and example as viewed by other Christians and non-Christians in the world. When we lead our "Gospel to Life, and Life to Gospel," life, we are "preaching without using words unless absolutely necessary," as our Holy Founder taught his followers. (Our Minister General, Tibor Kauser OFS, stated this in the first paragraph on page 3 of his letter. See attachment.) Guess we are on the same 'sheet of music,' or at least having similar thoughts.

Name one new idea, concept, or term you learned in your first class.

I learned a new word, "mystagogia," (Greek for, to lead through the mysteries) It is a beautiful term for a beautiful process of 'continued,' learning for the newly initiated Catholics after they receive their Easter Sacraments. And it can be applied to newly professed OFS's who are hungering for more spiritual food after the 'formal' initial formation classes are completed.

Birthdays



Pope Francis, in <u>Laudato Si</u> quotes St. Francis when he begins his beautiful letter with the same words St. Francis used to begin his Canticle, "*Praise be to you, my Lord*". Pope Francis then says, 'In the words of this beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us.'
