

The King Before All Things

Brothers and sisters,

Before we move into Advent, let's pause to ponder a great gift of our tradition in the Church - the Solemnity of Christ, King of the Universe. So much of how we understand the two seasons of Advent and Christmas should flow from this day.

On December 11, 1925 Pope Pius XI affirmed in his encyclical *Quas primas* that Christ Jesus is the first reason and final cause of all existing things. He did this in the face of a rising tide of fascism, and when he did, Franciscans around the world took note. Why? Because this teaching on Christ the King reflects Scripture, tradition and the deep insights of Franciscan theology.



In 1307, Bl. John Duns Scotus used this understanding of the *primacy of Christ* to defend his ideas about the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. After more than 600 years, the Church made the insights of this humble friar official. Christ the King and the Immaculate Conception are connected – and they both point to Christmas!

Perhaps this is the reason we have the hymn from Colossians in Evening Prayer II on Christmas:

He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church.

He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things He himself might be preeminent.

For in Him all the fullness was pleased to dwell, and through Him to reconcile all things for Him, making peace by the blood of His cross through Him, whether those on earth or those in heaven.

Holy Gospel: Nativity 'Christmas' (Mass at Dawn) 'C'

Alleluia LK 2:14

R. Alleluia, alleluia.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests.

Gospel LK 2:15-20

When the angels went away from them to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go, then, to Bethlehem to see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went in haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known the message that had been told them about this child.

All who heard it were amazed by what had been told them by the shepherds. And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart. Then the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told to them.

Commentary Luke associates Jesus with shepherds, poor people, members of a despised trade, just as he still does later with prostitutes and other kinds of sinners. These disadvantaged people have seen the light. "The glory of the Lord shone around them" (Lk 2:9). Hence their conclusion: "Let us go ... to see!" Luke wants us to do the same today: go and see and try to understand what has been told to you concerning this child. Mary should be your example.
