Reflecting beautifully on article 25 of our Rule, our Constitutions state:

This support for the life of the fraternity is a way of *paying it backward*. In choosing charities to support, we are just giving back to God what was always His anyway.

The same article in the Constitutions goes on to say:

Supporting our regional, national and international fraternities (remember, you belong to all!) is a way of *paying it forward*. Catechism of the Catholic Church: "the death penalty is inadmissible"

After an audience with Pope Francis earlier this year, and following his approval, the Vatican's CDF says it has made changes to the CCC on the death penalty according to which capital punishment is inadmissible. Franciscans everywhere have good reason to celebrate and ponder this.

ROME (Vatican News) - According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the death penalty now is no longer admissible under any circumstances. The Vatican announced on August 2 (the Feast of the Portiuncula!) that Pope Francis approved changes to the compendium of Catholic teaching published under Pope John Paul II.

The Catechism now reads:

2267. Recourse to the death penalty on the part of legitimate authority, following a fair trial, was long considered an appropriate response to the gravity of certain crimes and an acceptable, albeit extreme, means of safeguarding the common good.

Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not lost even after the commission of very serious crimes. In addition, a new understanding has emerged of the significance of penal sanctions imposed by the state. Lastly, more effective systems of detention have been developed, which ensure the due protection of citizens but, at the same time, do not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption.

Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that "the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person", and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide".

Holy Gospel for 22nd Sunday in Ordinary time, cycle B

Gospel MK 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus,

they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed, hands.

—For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews,

do not eat without carefully washing their hands,

keeping the tradition of the elders.

And on coming from the marketplace

they do not eat without purifying themselves.

And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed,

the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds. —

So the Pharisees and scribes questioned him,

"Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders

but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?"

He responded,

"Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written:

This people honors me with their lips,

but their hearts are far from me;

in vain do they worship me,

teaching as doctrines human precepts.

You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition."

He summoned the crowd again and said to them,

"Hear me, all of you, and understand.

Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile.

"From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile."

Just think, do you eat with clean or unclean hands, that is in the eyes of Jesus? (Editor)

May we be clean as the Lord Jesus teaches us to be clean. May we follow His teachings, and not the unholy traditions from men.

Summer Seminar for Secular Franciscans

Saint Francis University, July 2018, Loretto, Pennsylvania Sandy Baden, OFS, San Luis Rey Fraternity

My first impression was one of welcome in the small town of Loretto in which the University of Saint Francis resides. Entering Loretto is peaceful with its winding roads and beautiful homes – often with statues of Mary and St. Francis in the front yards. The lawns are all neatly mowed and cared for; there are no fences between neighbors.

Loretto is a small Catholic community founded in 1799 by Demetrius Augustine
Gallitzin, a Servant of God. He was a Roman Catholic priest serving as a missionary to the European immigrants in the United States. He had renamed the original McGuire
Settlement to 'Loretto' in honor of the Marian shrine in Italy. The town of Loretto has one main street, named after Our Lady: St. Mary Street. On it are several stately homes, one of which now contains the Friars Catholic Book Store. There's a fire station across the street in addition to small shops including a little grocery store and a deli.

This charming little town is surprising – after passing an exquisite <u>Carmelite Monastery</u> crafted from stone, you are greeted by a large sign announcing '<u>St. Francis University</u>' which offers the <u>OFS Summer Seminar</u>. Directly across the street is the friars' residence, Mt. Assisi Friary, originally the country home of American steel magnate <u>Charles M. Schwab</u>. The residence overlooks the opulent <u>Sunken Gardens</u>. The gardens are beyond beautiful; you can spend several hours here immersed in these sacred surroundings.

Our first day of the seminar was spent at the Friars' residence and gardens. There were approximately fifty Secular Franciscans attending and I was blessed with opportunity to speak with many. Br. Bob Herrick, OFM Cap. Gave a presentation on *Troubadour of the Great King, Knighthood, and music in the Life of Francis*. We, the Secular Franciscan participants, also shared insights on the life of St. Francis. The next three days were held at the University of Saint Francis.

We prayed Morning and Evening Liturgy of the Hours and celebrated Mass each day in the beautiful Immaculate Conception chapel.



The second day I forgot my badge and I was told not to worry because everyone already *knew* who I was since I had shared so much the previous day about our Fraternity and Formation program. An especially valuable part of the seminar was the social time each day; I learned so much from all the different fraternities! Many were also interested in our Fraternity and our Formation process, seeking to learn what might be relevant from our experience that they might be able to implement in their own fraternities. This interaction and learning from each other was such an incredible part of this wonderful gathering of Secular Franciscans.



In the final session, Br. Bob spoke on the Canticle of the Sun: Making the Spirituality of Francis Our Own.
Br. Bob's talk inspired a great deal of conversation on Francis and creation where I shared that I had written a poem that resonated with the theme of his talk. Br. Bob invited me to come forward and read my poem on "Flowers and Soil of God's Creation," to all the conference participants. I shared how I was inspired to write this poem following our Council's retreat this past winter at the Prince of Peace Benedictine Abbey.

I met many new friends and would recommend anyone from our Fraternity to attend a future year's seminar, if it is at all possible for you to do so.
