Minister's Note for December

It seems to me that as Brothers and Sisters of Penance, Advent, a joyous time of preparation and repentance is especially attuned to our Franciscan spirituality. Perhaps it is with a Franciscan sense of wonder that we are able to even better enter into Advent.

Fr. Jeffrey Kirby writes in <u>Crux</u> that 'For the believer, or the person of goodwill, who chooses to observe Advent, they are allowing themselves to receive the blessings of the season. While different in how they are given, based on personal temperament and authentic need, the blessings of Advent include hope, peace, reconciliation, and conversion.'

There a 'liminal space' in waiting. A space of unique blessings. In this liminal space, this space between, there can be hope, peace, reconciliation, conversion. We can move through this liminal space and allow ourselves to be transformed by God's graces. It's like that wonderful time of waiting and anticipation through the nine months of pregnancy for a baby to be born (and the joy St. Francis helped us celebrate at Greccio!). Waiting in anticipation for a dear friend's arrival. Waiting during the time of engagement a longed-for wedding. Tending for a dying loved one as Lady Jacoba did for Francis, waiting with them for the arrival of Sister Death, helping them to prepare for their journey home.

In this Advent-Amidst-a-Pandemic we have an opportunity to actually forgo excessive shopping and spend time in Scriptures. Rather than parties or gatherings, we can write heart-felt letters to family and friends that might need an uplifting thought or prayer. Especially during the pandemic, we can still share *joy*.

This 3rd Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, we focus not on the waiting, but on this unbounded joy. The Readings for today jump with joy! We light the rose-colored candle on the Advent wreath. Our long time of penitential waiting is nearly complete. There is light at the end of the tunnel. Our responsorial psalm today is stunningly beautiful: My soul rejoices in my God. My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked upon his lowly servant.

I invite you to peruse the many articles included in this Cord; our spiritual life is full of so much Joy; the story of Greccio and the Incarnation, Our Lady of Guadalupe, our invitation to help others through Catholic Charities. At our December 13th gathering, Sr. Mary Beth Ingraham will be joining us to talk about Franciscan Duns Scotus and the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception. There is so much joy!

Our Lady of Guadalupe



"Our Lady of Guadalupe," as she is commonly known, has many names attached to her image as she appeared on Dec. 9, 1531 to Juan Diego as a humble farmer and a Catholic convert. As I reflected on writing this article it occurred to me there is so much history and facts related to the miraculous occurrence of the Blessed Virgin Mary, anyone can look them up on the computer to see the dates and related investigations the Catholic Church undertook in approving of this apparition. I would like to keep this as a brief synopsis of a few items that may be of interest.

As "Our Lady of Guadalupe" appeared to the Aztec people of that time she seems to be attached to the Mexican people, however, she has also been given the title, "Our Lady of the Americas" which would make all of us smile in appreciation. Our Lady appears with a blue sash around her waist and flows down her dress which is an indication she is pregnant. How appropriate this is as her feast day has been given as

December 12th and she is waiting for birth of our Lord as we wait for the birth of our Lord on December 25th at Christmas. This clearly tells us this image of Our Lady of Guadalupe is a gift from God for love of life and for love of the unborn.

In the first apparition, Mary tells Juan Diego she has appeared because she wants a temple built in the exact spot she has appeared to heal the suffering people of Mexico. There were four apparitions in total, and the fourth apparition was to Juan's uncle who was ill and dying when he was miraculously healed.

Mary's image alone is miraculous as she is also appears on Juan's Tilma when the mystical roses fall to the ground and were picked by Juan in the middle of winter. No one can explain how the image appears glorious and detailed. It tells us the important message from God that Mary is there, and as Mary herself may say, "see me and hear me because I am your Mother."

Our Lady of Guadalupe appears to be alive in the image as it has been proven the reflection of the people present were reflected in her eyes. Her cloak she is wrapped depicts the constellation of stars at the exact moment of her first appearance to Juan Diego. We still have the Tilma today at the Church that was built in Mexico City to venerate as was seen in 1531.

Hail Mary full of Grace, bless us in your presence,
Hail Our Lady of Guadalupe,
Hail Our Lady of the Americas,
Hail Our Lady of the unborn,
Pray for us sinners at the hour of our death. AMEN!

Advent Morning of Reflection with Fr. Joe Chinnici, OFM "Becoming Fully Human: Celebrating Christmas with St. Francis of Assisi"

We had a most wonderful Advent Morning of Reflection led by Fr. Joe Chinnici, OFM at St. Mary's of Los Gatos in the Hoffman Center hosted by the Christian Formation Committee of the parish. While the elements raged outside as the storm of the year veraciously pounded the windows of the Center with rain and high gust, inside there was calm and peace as Fr. Joe led us into a deep reflection on the meaning of Christmas as St. Francis celebrated it. The 25 courageous souls who ventured out in this ungodly weather have certainly been blessed beyond their expectation.

Fr. Joe talked about the house of the Lord. How God wants a house He can dwell in. Not so much a physical building, but rather He wants to make a house of us where He can dwell, where He is present. One may ask why God waited so long with the incarnation. The Lord delays that we may be responsible for His coming. After 9/11, we felt His presence in the firemen, the ambulance workers, and the policemen who first arrived at the place of tragedy. A similar response occurred in Assisi after the big earthquake of the Fall of 1997. When Father visited the town at Christmas after the earthquake, the people of Assisi displayed their nativity scenes in their windows as usual. Only this time in place of putting shepherds and sheep around the manger, they placed firemen, fire trucks, ambulances, nurses and paramedics around the babe Jesus. They were the people who made present Jesus for them that Christmas.



At the crèche of Greccio, three years before his death, Francis recreates the first nativity scene in the midst of a Mass, and invites the whole town to witness. During Mass, in the empty manger, suddenly the babe Jesus appears in a vision. First the babe of Bethlehem is lifeless. Then Francis approaches the child, and wakes him up from a deep sleep. The babe Jesus is in the heart of each of us, we just need to wake him up - urged us Fr. Joe. We need to breath life into the babe. Since that vision in Greccio,


having a nativity scene in our churches during the Christmas season has become a tradition that spread all over the world.

Fr. Joe talked about simplicity as harmony between the inside and the outside. When our outward actions are in accord with our words, and inner believes, we live simply. This is a conversion, a conversion to simplicity. It grows, it's not given. We need to work on it. Then he asked us to reflect on what we really desire and what images shape our lives. What do we hunger for? The animals that ate from the manger of Greccio were cured form their diseases, and people with various illnesses were healed when the hay was placed on them. Jesus feeds us, satisfies our hunger, from the manger to the Eucharist. He is bread for us. What do we hunger for? Bread, freedom, spirit, truth, healing, understanding, peace, love, Jesus...? What are the necessities of my life, and how do I become food for others? - was our second reflection question.

We all really have one need. Love and be loved - said Fr. Joe. There is no greater love than this to become human for us. God became human for us. We have companionship. God is with us. He experienced frailty, temptation, discouragement, betrayal like us, because He was human. He showed us what it is to be fully human, and he loves us. We need to become fully human for others.

As our reflection came to a close at noon, the raging storm outside calmed down, and the rain stopped just long enough for us to get home safely. God indeed cares, and watches out for us. Merry Christmas

Specifically, this course will explore the stresses and graces American families encounter. It will also discuss the ways parishes can better serve families as well as generate ways to invite families to become active in their Church and world. Dr. Maureen Day is the Assistant Professor of Religion and Society at the Franciscan School of Theology in San Diego, CA. She was a theologian at the Diocese of San Diego's synod on the family and is married with two children.

Ministry in collaboration with the USCCB's Secretariat on Catholic Education. Maureen, her husband, and their two children attend St. Thomas More Catholic Church in Oceanside.
