

Minister's Note for September Our Lady and St. Francis – Each a Resounding 'Yes' to God



In September, we are invited to reflect on both the Birthday of our Lady (September 8th) and the Franciscan Feast of the Stigmata (September 17th). In holding both these beautiful commemorations in our hearts, I look to the commonalities – both Our Lady and St. Francis said a resounding 'yes' to God. Our Lady's 'Fiat' or 'yes' brought God's grace into the world as the Incarnation – Jesus. St. Francis followed Christ so fully and faithfully that he also brought Christ to the world so perfectly that he eventually bore the marks of the crucified Christ.

Francis did not choose the stigmata; he chose something much more difficult: he had chosen, simply, to follow Jesus. Francis chose to move forward each day following in the footsteps of the Lord. That can be frightening... who KNOWS where *that* will lead? Then he chose each day, despite what came... to still... follow. To allow himself to be Christ for others, and especially for the poor and marginalized. The stigmata was the outward sign of something that was innately *interior*. The true transformation occurred within. In the words of Fr. Dan Horan OFM, the stigmata was the *'exterior manifestation of a mystical relationship between the human person and God – proof of the transformative power of love.'*



Fr. Dan Horan OFM, invites us, on the Feast of the Stigmata —to look within, see how each of us does or does not bear the marks of Christ in our thoughts, words, and deeds. Perhaps we won't receive the marks of Christ in the form of five wounds, but we could certainly—and should certainly—make visible the presence of Christ in every other way. How are we called to make visible the presence of Christ to others?



The feast of the Stigmata is a reminder of the power of love, as seen in the opening prayer for the feast day Mass:

"Lord Jesus Christ, who reproduced in the flesh of the most blessed Francis, the sacred marks of your own sufferings, so that in a world grown cold our hearts might be filled with burning love of you, graciously enable us by his merits and prayers to bear the cross without faltering and to bring forth worthy fruits of penitence: You who are God, living and reigning with God the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever.

Amen."

Francis and St. Michael

Francis had a deep devotion to St. Michael, so much so that he instituted a personal Lent of St. Michael. This extended period of prayer and fasting began on The Feast of the Assumption (Aug. 15) and ended on what was then called Michaelmas (Sept. 29). In Francis' time the archangels each had a separate feast day. Because of St. Michaels role in salvation history his feast was one of the great feasts and in the middle ages was a day of obligation. At that time he was the patron saint of knights. Today he is patron of the police, military, doctors and has always been the chief warrior in defense of our Church.

Francis had at one time made a pilgrimage to a cave on the east coast of Italy where in 492 A.D.a bishop in the Church experienced an apparition of St. Michael. Michael told the bishop that he had consecrated the cave and wanted a church built over it. When Francis visited, he did not enter as he felt it was so holy. An interesting fact is that to this day, this is the only building of worship in the Catholic Church not consecrated by man. Thomas of Celano's comments on Francis devotion to the angels: "He venerated the angels with the greatest affection, for they are with us in battle and walk with us in the midst of the shadow of death. He often said that Blessed Michael should be especially honored because his duty is presenting souls to God."

In 1224 (two years before his death) Francis went to Mount LaVerna with three brothers to observe this lent. I find it fascinating that during this lent Francis received the stigmata around the time of the feast of the Exultation of the Cross (September 14th) by an angel (Seraph) with six wings and the body of the Crucified. Francis came down from the mountain on the Feast of St. Michael transformed into the likeness of the Crucified.



Another interesting connection for us comes from Pope Leo XIII who gave us our second rule in 1883. The following year (1884) after a Mass the Pope fell to the floor apparently dead, but was experiencing a vision of Satan's influence in the world in the coming century. He was so shaken by this he composed a prayer to St. Michael. This was added to the prayers after Mass from 1886 to 1968. After Vatican II it was removed, but in 1994 JPII urged people again to personally pray the St. Michael prayer.

We are living through troubling times now. Article 8 of our Rule states "As Jesus was the true worshiper of the Father, so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do." Could this encourage us to extend our time in prayer and contemplation? Consider adding St. Michael's prayer at the end of your rosary or to your prayers? In the Litany of the Saints, St. Michael is invoked second only to our Blessed Mother in that long list. He is our help in the battle that rages in our world and the Church, a battle already won. We should not lose hope. St. Michael is still our defender and we have recourse to him.

Prayer to St. Michael the Archangel



St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do thou, Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the Divine Power of God, cast into Hell Satan and all the evil spirits, who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen

The Stigmata of St. Francis - by Connie Collins, OFS

We all know the story of the stigmata of St. Francis, which we honor on September 17. This month may be a good time to reflect on what it means to us today.

In his *Second Book* on the life of St. Francis Thomas of Celano provides a descriptive account of the event of the stigmata:





While he was staying in that hermitage called La Verna ... two years prior to (when) he returned his soul to heaven, (Francis) saw in the vision of God a man, having six wings like a Seraph, standing over him, arms extended and feet joined, affixed to a cross. Two of his wings were raised up, two were stretched out over his head as if for flight, and two covered his whole body. When (he) saw these things, he was filled with the greatest awe, but could not decide what this vision meant for him. Moreover, he greatly rejoiced and was much delighted by the kind and gracious look that he saw the Seraph gave him ... but the fact that the Seraph was fixed to the cross and the bitter suffering of that passion thoroughly frightened him. Consequently, he got up both sad and happy as joy and sorrow took their turns in his heart.

While he was unable to perceive anything clearly understandable from the vision, its newness very much pressed upon his heart. Signs of the nails began to appear on his hands and feet, just as he had seen them ... on the crucified man hovering over him.

His hands and feet seemed to be pierced through the middle by nails, with the heads of the nails appearing on the inner part of his hands and also on the upper part of his feet, and their points protruding on opposite sides. Those marks on the inside of his hands were round, but rather oblong on the outside and small pieces of flesh were visible like the points of nails, bent over and flattened, extending beyond the flesh around them. On his feet, the marks of nails were stamped in the same way ... His right side was marked with an oblong scar, as if pierced with a lance m and this often dripped blood, so that his tunic and undergarments were frequently stained with his holy blood.

(Celano, in Armstrong, Hellman, & Short, 2001)

Reading this account can be difficult, but also wonderful. We see the great love between Francis and the Crucified Christ. We see great pain, as well. Although we have not had that profound, deep experience that Francis had, perhaps we can relate in our own way to the mixture of both joy and sorrow that he felt. Maybe we are coming closer to these feelings as we maintain our relative solitude during the pandemic.

We are witness, through Celano's account, to a love so deep that identification occurred in a mutually expressive way. The wounds of Christ are the deepest expression of love that humankind has ever known. That Francis was gifted with the marks of the stigmata inspires us to move into the experience of that deep love.


