#### Minister's Note for March

St. Francis of Assisi understood the humility of God.

St. Francis understood the humility of our most loving and powerful God becoming *Incarnate* as Jesus Christ. We celebrate this at Christmas. In the Eucharist, we experience the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the form of humble bread and wine. We celebrate this at every Mass. In the crucifixion, Jesus gave his life for us and for all creation. The crucifixion is the ultimate act of humility - of God's self-giving Love. Francis understood that Jesus was the Good Shepherd; a shepherd willing to lay down his life. Jesus was born out of God's love for us; he lived, preached, taught, healed, suffered, and died for us – out of his unfathomable love.

Long ago, Christians wanted to walk in the footsteps of Jesus – from the Praetorium where he was judged by Pilate and unjustly condemned by the angry crowd, to Calvary where he was crucified. Since the early years of Christianity, many of the Faithful went on pilgrimages to the far away Holy Land to walk the Way of the Cross. Eventually, the desire to participate in this devotion was transformed into the more accessible 'Stations of the Cross' at our own local parish churches. Praying the 'Stations of the Cross' has been a practice highly encouraged by Franciscans for centuries. To prayerfully walk the Way of the Cross and to contemplate Christ's passion, especially as a community, is to open *our* hearts to be transformed by the experience.

As we experience the Stations of the Cross this Lent, especially in a year where there has been so much suffering and grief felt by so many, let us open our hearts to conversion. Let us ask God to forgive our sins as we forgive the sins of others. Through our contemplation of the passion of Christ through the Stations, let us also *hunger* to experience the immeasurable love of Christ for us through the Sacraments, especially in the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist. Let us ask God, that like Francis, we look upon the Crucified Christ - and see God's immense love.

Please mark Friday, March 26th at 7pm in your calendars. Our evening Vespers for March will be the Fraternity praying the Stations of the Cross. We will gather on the last Friday of Lent, Friday March 26th at 7pm via Zoom. We, as a Council, would like to share this beautiful devotion with others. Please feel free to invite friends who would be called to such a reflection as well who may appreciate getting to know our community. #### St. Joseph, Protector of the Holy Family

St. Joseph, Son of David, not a word did you say in Scripture, but what a mark you have made as part of the Holy Family. As a compassionate and caring man, after a dream, you took Mary as your wife to protect our Lord in the womb and gave your "Yes" to God in your silence.

St. Joseph, Son of David, in your "Yes" to God you took the Holy Family and fled to Egypt to protect baby Jesus from harm and returned to Nazareth when called again by God. As an earthly father to Jesus you taught him your trade as a carpenter, and not a word did you say in Scripture.

St. Joseph, Son of David, you took the Holy Family to the Temple to present Jesus to the Lord and Simeon was blessed as he had seen the Messiah. Not a word did you utter in Scripture, and Mary pondered all these things in her heart.

St. Joseph, Son of David, the Holy Family traveled to Jerusalem, twelve years later for the Passover, and lost Jesus. Jesus was found in the Temple as you and Mary went looking for Him in sorrow and anxiety. Not a word was said by you in Scripture.

St. Joseph, Son of David, you are the Patron Saint of the dying, universal Church, families, fathers, expectant mothers travelers, immigrants, house sellers and buyers, craftsman, engineers, and working people. No word was said by you in Scripture in all you did for our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### St. Catherine of Genoa Third Order (1447 - 1510)

Powerful Example of Sacrament of Reconciliation

Catherine gives us a beautiful example during Lent to consider Art. 7 of our Rule, calling us to daily conversion and renewal through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Catherine was born into a powerful aristocratic family in Italy who married her at age 16 to another nobleman. He turned out to be selfish and unfaithful. In her sadness and desperation she also turned to a life of selfish pleasures.



Have you ever had a turning point in your life? Well, Catherine certainly did. She visited her sister (a Nun) on a retreat and was encouraged to go to confession. Her suffering seemed to have prepared her for a powerful conversion experience. She left with a powerful knowledge of God's love for her. Her grace filled change and good example also influenced her husband to conversion also. By this time, her husband had brought them to financial ruin. They both became Third Order Franciscans and moved together into a local hospital to dedicate themselves to works of charity there. After her husbands death (1497), a terrible four year plague broke out killing four-fifths of the population. We too are in the middle of a pandemic. We can look to emulate her strength and courage in discerning how we can minister to others as we are able.

Catherine died on the Feast of the Exultation of the Cross (Sept.15, 1510). She was exhumed 18 months later and found incorrupt. She was made Patroness of hospitals in Italy.

Can you relate to our OFS Sister? Have you felt the emptiness of worldly pleasures? Have you felt the comfort and joy of the loss of finances or material goods because they brought you greater riches?

Kelly and Joe have had a recent emphasis on the Psalms at mid- month Vespers . So many Psalms are penitential. I can't help but wonder if Catherine meditated on them. In general, Penitential Psalms end with a Canticle of Hope. "But Thou, my God, art my salvation, and Thou shall have pity on me." Exactly what happened to Catherine.

We are blessed as Catholics to have the Sacrament of Reconciliation to lead us to a realistic sense of our own sinfulness and the greatness of God's love. What a beautiful opportunity to prepare us to meet the needs of others as we are healed. I know because of COVID-19 many cannot access this in the presence of a priest, but we can access it through a perfect Act of Contrition until we can once again do it in person. We ask her intercession to bring us to true contrition and reconciliation with God and others.

If you have an interest in her writings I encourage you to read her two classic works. "A Treatise on Purgatory" and "A Dialogue of the Body and Soul" The Church concluded that these writings alone were evidence of her sanctity. They can be found on Librivox.org which has audio recordings of books in the public domain.



#### Remembering Joe Cannon, OFS



So, here we are in Lent, where alms is an important part of our Franciscan, Catholic, Christian obligation based of what we have and are able to give. Now, think about what you can do.




