

Minister's Note for April - The Joy of the Resurrection!

Francis of Assisi truly lived for 'Gospel to life and life to Gospel.' We are called to do the same! We have lived a shared Lent in the form of the pandemic that seems to have started in Lent 2019 and continued to this very day. We are not out of this yet – but we can feel a hope and a light at the end of this very long tunnel.

This month the Council wanted to embrace the joy that is Easter, this celebration of new Life, or our shared life in Jesus Christ. The gospels during the season of Easter are simply *resplendent*. We walk through this time of new belief, new beginnings, new understanding with the early Church. This is our journey too! Throughout this month of April, we ask you to take a fresh look at these amazing Gospels and what they mean for us. On April 4th we experience the Empty Tomb and not yet understanding what exactly that means... truth is unfolding. I just love this scene from John 20:1: 'On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb.' It's that quiet before the 'aha!' moment. It's the quiet moment before... everything changes.





On April 11th, we'll hear the story of what we in the west often call 'Doubting Thomas' – but which our Orthodox brothers and sisters call 'The Touching of Thomas.' Thomas was touched by the Risen Christ and believed. In fact, his statement of faith resonates through the centuries, 'My Lord and my God.'

We all want to be touched by Jesus. We all want to believe. We all have out questions and doubts. May we all live a life so dedicated to Christ and spreading the Gospel as did Thomas! He seems to have been an analytical guy, asking the right questions... In fact, in John 14:1-6, Jesus talks about the place prepared for each of us in his Father's house. It's Thomas who asks, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going, how can we know the way?' Jesus responds, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life...' Score another one for Thomas for being willing to ask the question.

On April 18th, we hear the story in Luke 24 where 'The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread.' How central is the Eucharist to our experience of the living Christ! Francis shared with us his deep reverence for the Eucharist and it's centrality to our faith. This past year, the centrality of the Eucharist has come into even sharper focus – it will be a joy for us to celebrate the Eucharist together again!

On April 25th, we hear the story of the Jesus as the Good Shepherd. A Shepherd who is willing to lay down his life for his flock. Of a Shepherd willing to sacrifice all to save even one lost sheep. With so much vying for our attention in this cacophonous world, may we also only hear and respond to the voice of the *Good* Shepherd.





"The Empty Tomb"


They laid Jesus in the tomb and then rolled a huge stone to close its entrance. No way in and no way out. As the women approached they see the stone is rolled away from the entrance and the tomb seems empty. Angels appear and announce, "He is not here, He has risen as He had said." How unbelievable this story is to our human understanding, but the wisdom of God and His love for us gives us the miracle of Christ's resurrection. How awesome is the gift of faith God has given.

When I was twelve years old in San Francisco, 1959, I was in Clinton's cafeteria with my mother and brother having lunch. I had noticed a well dressed gentleman watching us from his table. My mother, to my surprise, suggested we stop and pray before our meal. I bowed my head and said grace quietly. After the prayer the gentleman got up from his table and approached us. He handed me a postcard with a picture of a sand sculpture of Jesus praying in the garden of Gethsemane and said, "This is my card and that was beautiful." I remember I did not understand why he gave this card to me and not my mother or brother. I have since lost that beautiful postcard, and after 63 years I have searched the computer and discovered the sand sculpture artist was Ted Conibear. Pictures of him are what I remembered that gentleman had looked like. No doubt in my mind.

The attached picture was taken of one of Ted Conibear's sand sculptures of the tomb of Christ as it had looked 2,000 years ago and the tomb looks to be empty. Ted Conibear passed away in 1994 in his sleep. This wonderful man who touched my heart at age 12 now lies at the Fallbrook Masonic Cemetery in Fallbrook, Ca. The only surviving statue by Ted Conibear is titled, "Suffer the Little Children" and has been recovered in cement at his grave-site in the Fallbrook Masonic Cemetery. I intend to visit that grave-site in the near future.

Blessed Luchesio Modestini and Buonadonna Modestini - April 28, 1260

Our Very First Third Order Members

This married couple is traditionally recognized to be the first members of the Order of Penance, which later came to be called the Third Order of St. Francis. Luchesio was a merchant from the small town of Poggibonzi in Tuscany. He was reputed to be extremely greedy, as was his wife, Buonadonna.

There is no information on his conversion experience, but it must have been powerful as his wife also joined him in service to the poor. To keep him from covetousness, he also decided to give up his business. He was born about 1180 - 1182, so he would have been about the same age as Francis and would have been in business about the same time as Francis was working with his father in merchandising cloth.

After Luchesio's conversion, Francis happened to travel to Tuscany and visited him because of their prior business dealings. He rejoiced to see the change in this avaricious man. He then preached penance to the townspeople. Luchesio asked Francis for special instructions on how to live a holy life while in the world. Francis told him of his plan for an order for lay people. After hearing this, he and his wife asked to be accepted at once. Scholars believe that this must have happened not long after Francis had founded his first order in 1209. Francis gave the new lay order his first Primitive Rule. However, this first rule was supplanted in 1221 as worded by Cardinal Hugolino and approved by Pope Honorius.

Luchesio undoubtably was a man of hope and mercy. He was extremely generous to the poor. One day his wife became vexed when yet another poor soul showed up at their door asking for bread. Luchesio asked her to check their pantry, but Buonadonna knew what was in there and giving it away would cause them to go hungry. Luchesio remembered the generosity of Our Lord in multiplying the loaves and fishes, so asked her to get the food anyway. When she went to the pantry, it was not only filled with bread, but the best kinds of bread.

Like our OFS saint from last month, St. Catherine of Genoa, the town of Poggibonzi also suffered a plague. To help the poor and sick, Luchesio packed necessities on his donkey to deliver. When he ran out of supplies he would beg from others. In 1260 he became very ill with no hope of recovery. Buonadonna requested of him to, "Implore God, who gave us to each other as companions in life to now permit us to also die together". After complying with her wishes, Buonadonna fell ill with a fever and died before him on the same day, April 28, 1260. They are buried at the Franciscan Church in Poggibonzi where many miracles have been reported. Luchesio was declared Blessed by Pope Pius VI. There is a Plenary Indulgence for the OFS (Renewal of Tertiary Engagements). I could not find any other information on the indulgence other than this.

"That very day two of them were going to a village named Emma'us ...and talking with each other about all these things (the crucifixion and empty tomb) that had happened. While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him" (Luke 24:13-16).

It seems inconceivable that the disciples, while walking and talking about the crucifixion of Jesus that had happened just days ago, and when another man fell into step with them, would not recognize him as the one whose death and mysterious disappearance they were lamenting!. Jesus himself! Who wouldn't recognize him? *Would we?*

"When he was at table with them, he took bread and blessed it and broke it, and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognized him." (Luke 24:30-31)

I remember clearly one day early in the pandemic when I was "attending" mass at home. I was dearly missing the communal celebration of the Eucharist – and lamenting the "loss" of communion. Then when we said the Act of Spiritual Communion, I suddenly saw in my mind's eye the faces of homeless and disenfranchised individuals. At that moment I recognized the face of Jesus. Where else might we see him today?

Todays Gospel is one of comfort for those of us who question everything.

At first, I welcomed the lockdown as a chance for meditation, an opportunity to run around less and pray more. Then the real cost in human life became apparent. The loss of normal church gatherings, as we attended Mass via internet, as my dear Franciscans went to Zoom and the easy conviviality of parish life became a fond memory. Though food was certainly available, grocery shopping became very hazardous. In July, my dear friend Ali the chocolate lab died, regardless of my best efforts to comfort and assure her, and cushion her joints on rides to the park.

By this time, any illusions I had about being in control of my life, fate, or fortunes - or the lives and well-being of those I love - were over.

About this time, I began a lengthy study of the ecological causes of the pandemic and the many disruptions caused by pollution and a blatant disregard for the natural world. The very Nature we are pledged to treasure. The science is clear: we can reverse climate disruption, air and water pollution, and the wholesale extinction of most animal species — our own included — if we move quickly and compassionately.

Our prayers and suffering this past year may bring us out of this transformed. Many of us who suffered major losses – personal, financial, emotional – are



now enriched with greater insight. Our lives won't just go on as before, because we are different people. We have been chastened, pruned and rendered repentant.

As we continue to pray: let us pray for the healing of the blindness, greed, and indifference to the natural world that brought us to this juncture. Let us pray all hurts breed new compassion.

Now we see how we are all connected – the earth and all life on earth, our own included. And going forward from this time of Lent – on to Easter and the promise of Pentecost – our hearts begin to heal. Refreshed in the beauty of His spectacular creation, we are enveloped by His

love.

I remember the person I was last year, and trust God to bless the person I've become.





What's so special about April 16th? It's our birthday!!! According to Britannica:

In 1209 Francis composed for his mendicant <u>disciples</u>, or <u>friars</u>, a simple rule (Regula primitiva, "Primitive Rule") drawn from passages in the <u>Bible</u>: "To follow the teachings of our Lord <u>Jesus Christ</u> and to walk in his footsteps." He then led the group of 12 disciples to Rome to seek the approval of <u>Pope Innocent III</u>. At first Innocent was hesitant, but, following a dream in which he saw Francis holding up the church of San Giovanni in Laterano, he gave oral <u>approbation</u> to the Franciscan rule of life. This event, which according to tradition, occurred on April 16, 1210, marked the official founding of the <u>Franciscan order</u>. The <u>Friars Minor</u>, or Lesser Brothers, as they came to be known, were street preachers with no possessions and only the Porziuncola as a center.

Sr. Kathy Warren, OSF, is the Director for Women Religious for the Diocese of San Diego and will be joining us at the invitation of Sr. Madeline Fitzgerald, OSC. You may remember Sister Kathy from when we studied her book, 'The Sultan and the Saint.'

Sr. Kathy will help us to start unwrapping and diving into this beautiful document. As a Council, we'd like to unfold this very important text over several sessions – this talk with Sr. Kathy will be our first. You can start diving in ahead of time to make the best use of our time with Sr. Kathy! You can access the entire text of the 'Fratelli Tutti' document on the Vatican website.

The USCCB says of *Fratelli Tutti*, that it 'was released in October 2020. An invitation to renewed social friendship and universal fraternity, this encyclical was published as the global community was seven months into the COVID-19 pandemic. A call to come together in solidarity, *Fratelli Tutti* provides a starting point for renewing our commitment to caring for our neighbor and a global society built on justice and the common good. The USCCB has a Fratelli Tutti study guide here.

Just look at how this letter begins — with Pope Francis acknowledging how St. Francis referred to 'All Brothers:" ... Fratelli Tutti... Pope Francis says that "With these words, Saint Francis of Assisi addressed his brothers and sisters and proposed to them a way of life marked by the flavor of the Gospel. Of the counsels Francis offered, I would like to select the one in which he calls for a love that transcends the barriers of geography and distance, and declares blessed all those who love their brother "as much when he is far away from him as when he is with him".



We look forward to beginning our Fraternity 'Fratelli Tutti' journey with Sr. Kathy Warren on May 9th.


