## Minister's Note for July

How beautiful it is to enter into summer – still with Coronavirus concerns, but also with hope. It will take years to understand the many ways in which the Coronavirus has impacted our communities and culture, likely across generations. As we continue to pray for those impacted by the pandemic, especially globally – *there is hope*. Francis was a man of hope and could find it inn each situation, even experiencing difficult situations as *perfect joy*. We benefit by his example and in his way of so beautifully following in the footsteps of Christ. We feel his positive influence even today.



Julia Greeley OFS was a was a powerful Franciscan influence in the world. Julia was an enslaved person who after obtaining her freedom chose to become an angel of mercy to others. She was an enthusiastic parishioner, a daily communicant, and became an active member of the Secular Franciscan Order starting in 1901. She was a promoter of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Some called Julia a 'one person St. Vincent de Paul Society." Virginia Haddad OFS, will be our guest speaker at our July Zoom gathering to share Julia's story.

**St. Ignatius Loyola** did so many amazing things as he responded to God's call. No, he's not a Franciscan, but was very much influenced by Franciscan spirituality, including by several Franciscan women in his own family. His feast day is July 27<sup>th</sup>. Jesuits can point to St. Francis as being an inspiration – after all, we do have a Jesuit pope named *'Francis.'* 

**Transitus of St. Clare on August 11th** – A person who was most powerfully influenced by the spirituality of St. Francis of Assisi – was St. Clare of Assisi. Please reserve her feast day, Wednesday, August 11<sup>th</sup>, for a 'Transitus of Clare' vespers at 7pm via Zoom. She was the 'little plant' that helped to seed a forest of goodness in the world.





Please mark your calendars for August 27th. St. Luis the King of France, the patron saint of the Secular Franciscan Order was another such person influenced by St. Francis. Mission San Luis Rey Parish will be honoring his feast day on Friday evening August 27th with an outdoor Mass in front of the Old Mission and a great deal of celebration. We, as a Secular Franciscan Fraternity, will be hosting a booth and fundraising with calligraphy that Fr. Franklin Fong OFM had gifted to us for such a cause. Please mark your calendars — it would be good for us to be a part in bringing this joyful Franciscan influence into the world.

## The Face of Charity



For many of us, the name St. Vincent de Paul brings to mind charitable organizations, including thrift shops, shelters, and emergency services. St. Vincent is, after all, the patron saint of charitable societies.

Vincent was born in 1581 in Pouy, France, and although he was not a Franciscan himself, his earliest education was by Franciscans. Perhaps that is where the seeds of charity were planted. Vincent's life was far from boring. He was ordained in 1600, educated at the University of Toulouse, captured by pirates, and sold as a slave. He eventually escaped his captors, finished his studies in Rome, and then settled in Paris, where he served as a village priest. Vincent founded the Confraternities of Charity, the Congregation of the Mission, and the Daughters of Charity.

The first Vincentian organization was the original Confraternity of Charity, which was comprised of laywomen who were dedicated to performing works of charity, including caring for sick babies. In 1620 a similar Confraternity was established for laymen. The men's religious order, the Congregation of the Missions, also called the Vincentians or Lazarists, was founded in 1625, with a mission to evangelize to the poor. Their values are "Vincentian personalism, radical hospitality, integrity, and a belief in the dignity of every individual."





The women's religious order, the Company of the Daughters of Charity, was founded in 1633 by St. Vincent and Louise de Marillac. Their mission was to serve the poorest of the poor. They were to minister to the world, rather than to remain cloistered. We are familiar with the Sisters' traditional habit with its distinctive cornette. The American Sisters of Charity, founded by Elizabeth Ann Seton in 1809, was modeled after the French order, adapting their Rule to suit American life.

St. Vincent de Paul died in 1660 and was canonized in 1737. He is known for his compassion for the poor, his dedication to charity, and his efforts to reform the clergy. Trivia: The "de Paul" of Vincent's name was originally "Depaul," and was likely related to a local stream named the "Paul."

We as Franciscans can certainly relate to Vincentian values and compassion for the poor. As we move through this phase of a very tough couple of years, we can begin to look forward to resuming our in-person ministries to the poor and disenfranchised, such as serving at Brother Benno's and visiting the imprisoned. What other ministries and activities do we perform, or plan to engage in, as followers of Francis?

## Julia Greeley, OFS - Servant of God



Meet a beautiful fellow Secular Franciscan, Julia Greeley. Julia was born into slavery and was freed under the Emancipation Proclamation in 1865. Born in Missouri, she moved west and became a cook and nanny in Colorado. Her employers introduced her to the Catholic faith and she was baptized in 1880. In 1901 she joined the Third Order of St. Francis and was active the rest of her life.

Julia, also devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, spent many hours each month visiting the firehouses in the Denver area bringing them literature and friendship to aid them in their

dangerous vocation. It was remarked by one that she was a "one person St. Vincent de Paul Society." Julia is fondly honored even today as 'Denver's Angel of Charity.'

Just as our Holy Father takes the love of God outside the walls of the Church, for instance his Holy Thursday tradition of washing the feet of those in such places such as prisons, refugee camps, and juvenile detention centers, Julia dramatically took her love of God outside the walls of the Church and into the world. As Secular Franciscans, we are called to do the same.

What an amazing sister and exemplar we have in Julia Greeley! As fellow Secular Franciscans let us ask how we might serve others in the ways Our Lord challenges us in our families, fraternity, Church, and the world. Julia's story inspired Fr. Regis Scanlon, OFM,Cap. to found the <u>Julia Greeley Home</u> in Denver for homeless women. Another beautiful place to engage with Julia's story is the very prayerful website of the <u>Julia Greely Guild</u>. Please also check out a <u>book by Fr. Blaine Burkey, OFM Cap</u>. whose proceeds support her cause for canonization.

I would like to close with a prayer composed when the Julia Greeley Home was founded. It has been approved for used in non-liturgical gatherings by Rev. James D. Conley, S.T.L. Apostolic Administrator (2011-2012) for Archdiocese of Denver.

#### Dear Julia Greeley,

Friend of the homeless, pray for us to Jesus, who suffered so much and for our sake had no where to lay his head.

Julia, devoted servant of the Sacred Heart, implore the powerful intercession of the Blessed Mother and ask for her help in all our needs, especially the needs of those who have no one to pray for them.

Julia, Gentle champion of the lonely and powerless, please ask for the protection dear St. Joseph, guardian of the Holy Family.

And please pray, dear Julia, for our urgent request, that the Eternal God, defender of the weak, will grant us the blessing of a shelter for all single homeless women in the Denver area, that they may find a suitable refuge in keeping with their human and moral dignity. AMEN.

## JPIC Thoughts for July

Karron Esmonde is our Fraternity JPIC Animator and has been doing an *amazing* job of sharing with us the reverberations of Laudato Si combating the devastating impact of climate change. You may recall Karron shared a video called <u>Three Seconds</u> on this subject. I was thinking of this great, big, problem the other day and was wondering how to take a little piece of it – something I could do and share with others... and I think I found it... I found the fourth 'R.'

Did you even realize you were missing an 'R?' I didn't ... until I found it – R. *REFUSE*. You've heard of *Reduce*, *Reuse*, *Recycle*. Add 'Refuse' to the beginning of that litany. **Refuse**... If we are offered a 'Two for the Price of One...' Do we need two of that thing? A 'free' water bottle at the store... a 'free' promotional anything? a 'free' plastic toothbrush at the dentist... plastic knives and forks. Another serving platter? A new cell phone just now? Just **Refuse** that stuff. I was impressed to learn how the DeSpain's do Christmas gifts – they usually chose charitable donations for each family member and use the selection of charities and causes as a teaching moment for the family. No extraneous 'stuff.' Although I'm not *there* yet, it is aspirational. (One Christmas when the kids were little, we chose a



goat out of a catalog for an impoverished family. I thought I was totally super-mom teaching all the right things... until Christmas morning... when the kids were disappointed they couldn't find *their* goat bleating under the tree!).

**To refuse is powerful.** Often times I'll tell myself, if I don't use something I'll donate it — but really, how many people avoid a purchase in the store and buy a water bottle from Goodwill instead? Unleash your inner toddler: **commit to Refuse.** Each time before we purchase... Let's turn to God and ask — 'Do I really need this extraneous thing?' If not... Cross your emotional arms... and **Refuse.**

I remember so fondly this poem I learned in first grade, now many years ago. It was "Trees" by Joyce Kilmer, and I am happy to note that I carry in my memory these four of the six verses and recite them often when I am walking or hiking with grandsons.

In this consumer driven world, it is wise to remind our young ones that our Loving Lord makes the earth and all that is in it. And it is wise for us to remember that the Lord created the world with exquisite balances, to keep it healthy and sustained. It is we, as humans, who have been called to safeguard it. It is we, as Franciscans, who are called to be in universal kinship with it and invite others to do the same.

The San Diego Union-Tribune, our local newspaper, ran an article by Greg Moran on June 27 reminding us of the importance of trees. He said and I quote,

Summer has just arrived and already temperatures are soaring as residents prepare for the inevitable "July Fry." At least we have one tool to fight the warming climate — trees, which provide shade, soak up carbon and

can reduce heat-related illnesses like heat stroke and heat exhaustion.

Mr. Moran went on to detail the inequitable distribution of trees within our community, with the poorer sections having less trees when, in fact, more are needed.

Our Care for Creation Team for the Diocese of San Diego is sponsoring a tree planting in September. I personally have learned that it requires some special love and care to plant and grow a tree but there are resources available to teach those of us who want to endeavor on this project to do so.
