Saint Maxmilian Kolbe

Saint Maximilian Kolbe was a Conventual Franciscan priest who spread devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary through print and radio in Japan and his native Poland and active in promoting the veneration of the Immaculate Virgin Mary, founding a monastery near Warsaw. In Auschwitz, Karl Fritzch, the deputy camp Commander, chose to pick ten men to be starved to death in an underground bunker to deter escape attempts. When one of the men, Franciszek Gajowniczek, cried out, "My wife, My children!" Kolbe volunteered to die in his place. According to an eyewitness, who was an assistant janitor at that time, in his prison cell Kolbe led the prisoners in prayer. Each time the guards checked on him, he was standing or kneeling in the middle of the cell and looking calmly at those who entered. After they had been starved and deprived of water for two weeks, only Kolbe remained alive. The guards wanted the bunker emptied, so they gave Kolbe a lethal injection of carbolic acid. Kolbe is said to have raised his left arm and calmly waited for the deadly injection. He died on 14 August 1941 at the age of 47. His remains were cremated on 15 August, the feast day of the Assumption of Mary. He was Beatified 17 October 1971 by Pope Paul VI and Canonized 10 October 1982 by Pope John Paul II. The man Kolbe saved at Auschwitz, Franciszek Gajowniczek, survived the Holocaust and was present as a guest at both the beatification and canonization of the Saint.

Abandoning Ourselves to Our Heavenly Father and Mother

Jesus himself in the Garden of Olives said, when he was begging his Father to release him from the appalling suffering that awaited him: "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will" (Mt 26:39). And the cup did not go away, and Jesus, the Son of God, went through a heartrending Passion. God knows better than we do what is useful: health or sickness, wealth or poverty, respect or defamation. We can and should pray when we are discouraged, but it is essential to defer to the will of God.

If (your suffering) were to increase even one degree your glory in heaven for all eternity, then it would secure an infinite benefit. Life passes quickly, even suffering passes, while eternity will last forever. It is worth it.



I invite you to give yourself to the divine Immaculate Mother, as a child to the best of mothers. Appeal to her with simplicity in all your worries, sufferings, and temptations and she will happily accompany you throughout this short life. And how blessed death will be, under the cloak of the Immaculate! None of those who love her will be lost forever. Courage, then!

St. Clare of Assisi

Last month I took Fr. Tom Herbst, OFM continuing education class on The Theology, Philosophy, and Spiritual Anthropology of St. Bonaventure. He shed light on the Letters of St. Clare to Agnes of Prague in which Clare directs Agnes to look into the mirror as a way to contemplate Christ.



"Place your mind before the mirror of eternity!
Place your soul in the brilliance of glory!
Place your heart in the figure of the divine substance
and through contemplation,
transform your entire being in the image
of the God head Itself,
so that you too may feel what friends feel
in tasting the hidden sweetness
that, from the beginning,
God himself reserved for His lovers."



St. Clare of Assisi, 3rd Letter to Agnes of Prague 12-17 From Early Documents: Clare of Assisi, The Lady

The great Greek philospher Plato, popular in Clare's time, uses the image of the mirror in his work "The Republic", as a means to understand the difference between the ideals of created things, that only exist in the mind of God, and the actual created things. The idea comes first before the material existence. The idea of the horse was in the mind of God before the horse was spoken into existence. In Nature many different breeds of horse exist, they vary in size, color etc., but when we look at them we call all of them horse. We can tell it's not an elephant or a lion but a horse. So we have a picture of the idea of a horse in our mind. The actual creature is a reflection of this ideal horse.

For instance the idea of a human being is conceived in the Mind of God like let's say a "prototype" from which all actual humans are created. Each being reflect the "prototype", like an image in a mirror reflects a real being. The image in the mirror is not the real thing, it simply reflects what the original looks like. God created man in his image and likeness (Genesis 1:26-27). Thus when we look into the mirror we reflect our creator. This can be used as a subject of contemplation. How do we reflect our Creator?

"Gaze upon the mirror each day., O Queen and Spouse of Jesus Christ, and continually study your face in it, that you may adorn yourself completely, ...

Fourth Letter of Clare to Agnes.

Clare teaches us to reflect and contemplate on Christ's poverty, humility and charity as we move from the edge of the mirror to its very center where we encounter the crucified Lord who endured tremendous suffering and a most shameful death for the redemption of the whole human race. What "ineffable charity"! - exclaims St. Clare.

All mid-candidacy interviews have been completed with Sr. Madeline and myself. The next step is to gather Letters of Intent to Profess as we approach the home stretch.

In August we are covering two chapters of the Journey text. Chapter 22 is on the Foundations for the Kingdom. It covers article 14 which focuses on building a more fraternal and evangelical world. Chapter 23 covers Justice and Franciscan life and article 15.
