Minister's Note for September

I was driving home from early morning exercise with the sun shining and was *surprised* by the traffic – and all the joy and excitement – spilling out in the neighborhoods. It was **BACK TO SCHOOL!** You could feel the joy of people coming together again!

We are also invited to feel that same joy! Although Zoom will continue to be an option for our formal Gathering between 1pm-3pm, there is so much more to our days together than the 2 hours shared on Zoom. For those are physically able to venture outside their homes, we are invited to come back in joy to all that our day is together: Mass, a meal, prayer, and our Gathering.

- Mass is at 10am over at Mission San Luis Rey parish. We each have our own parishes... but this is about us coming together as a *Fraternity*. If you'd like to join us, arrive a few minutes early and look for other fraternity members in the area in front of the large ambo.

I love this because although we each pray at home, we don't pray like this at home. This is an important and prayerful experience of community.
- Our gathering follows between 1pm-3pm and is also simulcast on Zoom.

Just as we joined hands with the Minister when we first professed, there is great joy in coming together. Join us for what you are physically able. The doors will be open (as well as the windows). You are welcome to wear a mask. Coming together for Mass, meal, prayer is something we've done for years (begun while David York was Minister, continued by Donna Foley, and under the previous and current Council). It's time to be invited back again to more fully experience this 'community.' Marta will again be highlighting all these joyous opportunities on the front page of the Cord.

Sharing the Fruits and Joy of the Quinquennial



I feel blessed to have attended two Q's in my life and they were mountain top experiences. It is something that many have not yet experienced or can because of health, time or expense. This year we were blessed to have three members from our fraternity attend; Sam DeSantis, Carol Imhoff, and Linda Gossett.

The council has asked them to share their reflections at our September meeting. In addition I will be giving a short introduction to the keynote speakers. A link will be included so you can access their presentations at your convenience. We are grateful that out National Fraternity has provided them to us.

The theme of the Q was "Franciscan Jubilee", celebrating 100 years since the first one in Chicago in 1921. The subtheme was "Celebrate & Renew our Franciscan Calling in the Spirit of Conversion". Jan Parker, our national minister shared... we are bearers of peace and messengers of joy when we remember who we are called to be and live it and start again...tending to our own conversion as well as the conversion of society (Tau-USA Issue 106). All the videos speak to this theme in greater depth.

Here are introductions to the speakers you can listen to. Each presentation is an hour+ in length. There are some minor audio glitches but nothing that detracts from the message. <u>Updates from the Q</u> – <u>August 3rd through 7th, 2022 – Secular Franciscan Order – USA (secular franciscan Scansusa.org)</u>

- 1. Fr. David Couturier OFM Cap. He emphasized art. 14 as key in **our calling** and **goals.** <u>Called</u> to build a more fraternal and evangelical world with all people of good will...(<u>the goal</u>).
 - I would like to add here that he offered to all OFS a <u>new handbook</u> which has just been released and made available through St. Bonaventure University on the latest research into the life of St. Francis. It can be downloaded from this link and includes a 120 page handbook containing links to short video lectures by two Franciscan scholars plus supplementary readings. The only requirement is filling out a short 1 minute survey.
- 2. Bishop John Stowe, OFM, Conv. Spoke on the vision and priorities of Pope Francis in choosing the name of Francis of Assisi. He examines Pope Francis Joy of the Gospel and how the OFS are called to be part of the renewal of the church.
- 3. Our Minister General Tibor Kauser from Hungary and Vice Minister Mary Stronach from USA spoke on the state of the worldwide OFS. He spoke on the relativism rampant today and Fratelli Tutti. He made a strong point on knowing our Constitution. He stressed Art. 12.1 in his talk (In a nutshell...we are called to bear witness to our faith in family life...work...joys and sufferings... associations with all brothers and sisters...in presence and participation in society...and fraternal relationship with all creatures.)
- 4. Rejoice in the Choice was presented by five OFS Seculars who have been active on the National and International level in various ways. Doug and Marion Clorey are from Prince Edward Island, Canada and Tim and Kathy Taormina and daughter Lori Hinker have been very involved in YOUFRA. They shared covering the evolution of our Rule and how they were built on each other and the changing times. Fraternity and our mission were strongly emphasized.

I am looking forward to being a moderator in September to have our members enlighten you on their experience.

The Theology and Philosophy of St. Bonaventure - Part 1

This is a series of four articles, one per months, on the theology and philosophy of St. Bonaventure based on a weeklong Continuing Education Course I took at the Franciscan School of Theology this Summer given by Fr. Tom Herbst, OFM.

In order to understand St. Bonaventure, we first have to know his background, the time, and scholastic ethos he lived in. St. Bonaventure is a second generation Franciscan being born in 1217 not far from Assisi. He never met St. Francis. According to his mom, he was cured from a serious illness in his childhood through the intercession of St. Francis. Italy was Franciscan territory at the time of Bonaventure. Central Italy was absolutely saturated with Franciscan influence throughout the 13th Century. You couldn't take a breath without being a Franciscan breath. Bonaventure's dad was a medical doctor that places him in the middle class. Bonaventure was a bright kid, was sent to the University of Paris as a young teenager, and obtained his doctorate in theology.

Prior to the high Medieval period (1090 to 1300 AD), the dominant Christ picture is the triumphant Christ, depicted as king and warrior who incarnates to battle with Satan. On the cross He is rigidly straight, no blood, dressed like a king. He is looking right at you, and not happy. He sees you at the core of your being. That changes in the late 11th century from triumphant Christ to suffering Christ. The San Damiano cross depicts Christ as the suffering servant, half old, half new Christ. He is not looking right at you, and there is blood everywhere. He is the picture of holistic compassion that wants to embrace. Climate change, global warming, is a major factor in a positive way during this period of close to 300 years. Europe's population more than doubles because more land can be cultivated, new towns are born, and migration stops. There is a newly positive view of nature. Prior to this period Nature was viewed as the devil's playground. Nature was dangerous, to be feared. It was believed that the natural world is an exile and one's real home is in heaven.

That changes in the high Medieval period. Nature speaks of the existence of God, in the beauty of Nature one encounters God. Bonaventure has a deep experience when he retreats to Mount LaVerna in 1259 where St. Francis received his stigmata. Bonaventure was seeking peace and spiritual renewal. The Soul Journey into God is out of his mystical experience there. In the 7th stage of the Soul Journey into God, the soul arrives at the beatific vision. The beatific vision for Bonaventure is the crucified Christ. He understands St. Francis experience with the six wings seraph. Christ is a tangible reality - He is present in every place and every time. Christ is historically tangible. He is the leading man in the play of history. Christ is in every scene, and wants to meet you.

Aristotle's philosophy of cause and effect took Europe by a storm in the first decade of the 12th century. Christians took back land in Spain held by Arabs for 500 years. Aristotelian manuscripts were discovered. The government paid for translation from Arabic to Greek, then from Greek to Latin. It revolutionized Western thought. Aristotelian philosophy and deductive reasoning gradually replaced Neo-Platonism. Everything has a cause except the original cause who is God. God is at the center,

everything is connected to him, and through him all things are connected. It's not just between me and God says Bonaventure. It's between me, you, and God. If I don't have a relationship with you, I don't have a relationship with God. We're living in an Aristotelian world now for 800 years.

Next month's article will be on the trinitarian theology of St. Bonaventure.




