Dear Sisters and Brothers,

It's the most wonderful time of the year.... and we have the opportunity to share the love of Christ. Last year we donated sleeping bags socks and toiletries to Br. Benno's at our December gathering.

This December we are blessed to have a Day of Recollection and luncheon gifted to us by our deceased Sister Edna Patterson, OFS. Let us open our hearts and ...place ourselves on an equal basis with all people, especially the lowly... (art. 13) We are messengers of perfect joy in every circumstance. We should strive to bring joy and hope to others. (art. 19)

This December we will meet on Gaudate Sunday. The council asks you to joyfully participate again by bringing that joy to the children served at Br. Benno's in Oceanside. Bring an unwrapped toy, stuffed animal, or gifts geared to children of all ages. You may also gift adults with donations of toiletries (shampoo, soap, toothpaste, etc.) socks, diapers, etc. All are gratefully accepted. Corinne has offered to deliver whatever is collected.

I recently researched the history of this wonderful apostolate. I was so impressed! I wish I lived closer to volunteer my time but perhaps this article might generate interest interest in those in the area who are passionate about our struggling brothers and sisters. Rock and I have served and supported Valley Restart, a much smaller shelter in Hemet for years. Please talk to Eileen Costa who has volunteered many years in service at Br. Bennos for her valuable insights.

History: I will give a brief overview but am attaching a link with a nine-minute video that will bring this all to life. <u>Our History – Brother Benno's</u> Br. Benno's was founded in 1983 by a Catholic couple (Harold and Kay Kutler). They were originally inspired by a Marriage Encounter weekend and a Eucharistic Congress where Mother Teresa of Calcutta was a speaker to open a small soup kitchen in Oceanside. They were also inspired to name it Br. Bennos because of their connection with a Benedictine Monk who had been active in Oceanside helping the homeless. When you watch the short video you will be amazed with what they have done in less than 40 years.

In 1991 they moved from downtown Oceanside to 3260 Production Ave. It is only two or three miles away from San Luis Rey Mission. Harold and Kay realized people needed a lot more than food. This facility is a 12,00 sq ft warehouse that has been divided into a dining room, full kitchen, children's reading room, offices, showers, clothing room, computer lab, chapel and warehouse space.

The need for a recovery program became evident. This is brought out in the link. Fellowship is a critical component in what they do. Since they do not depend on government help they can operate in a more free way. They totally depend on volunteers. They stated that they would not be in existence without them. Ninety percent of their funding is private donations and the volunteers are a combination of ecumenical, businesses, and other community groups. They are highly rated as a charitable organization to donate to.

The Cord, December 2022 St. Bonaventure Part 4 - based on Fr. Tom Herbst, OFM lectures

The Theology of St. Bonaventure

Who is Christ Jesus? He is the Savior. What did he come to do? Salvation. He wants to lead us back to the Father. We can't do it on our own. We lost our way because of the disobedience of Adam and Eve. Men couldn't walk and talk with God the Father directly anymore. In obedience, one is aligned with God, His will, and with Creation itself. Disobedience severs our relationship with God and Creation. Although we have freedom of choice, that is we can choose between good and evil, and accept God who is all good or reject Him, but we do not have the authority, or right to define what is good and what is evil aside from God. The tree of knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden of Eden symbolizes that according to the Encyclical of St. John Paul II, *Veritatis Splendor*:

"35. In the Book of Genesis we read: "The Lord God commanded the man, saying, 'You may eat freely of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die" (Gen 2: 16-17).

With this imagery, Revelation teaches that "the power to decide what is good and what is evil does not belong to man, but to God alone." The man is certainly free, inasmuch as he can understand and accept God's commands. And he possesses an extremely far-reaching freedom, since he can eat "of every tree of the garden". But his freedom is not unlimited: it must halt before the "tree of the knowledge of good and evil", for it is called to accept the moral law given by God. In fact, human freedom finds its authentic and complete fulfillment precisely in the acceptance of that law. God, who alone is good, knows perfectly what is good for man, and by virtue of his very love proposes this good to man in the commandments." (Pope John Paul II, Veritatis Splendor)

In Genesis Chapter 1, God creates the world in 6 Days. On Day 1, the Spirit of God hovers over the primordial darkness (chaos). God says "Let there be light", and light is separated from darkness. At the end of the six days, "God saw everything he had made, and behold it was <u>very good.</u>" (*Genesis 1:31*) Then he rested on the 7th Day. Creation is not only good, but very good. However, the disobedience of Adam and Eve corrupted creation. They chose death instead of life by eating of the forbidden fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, and were cast out of the garden of Eden, of eternal life.

We don't have to look too far today to find people who, apart from God, are redefining what's good and what's bad. Even some of our own elected officials are doing it by redefining sex, gender, marriage, and making abortion a constitutional right. It's getting more and more confusing to know what's good. The definition can of course change tomorrow. Truth is now all relative.




Figure 1: Seven Days of Creation Hierarchical Pyramid Walk back to Paradise Christ

Father Tom explains that Bonaventure depicts the natural order of creation as a pyramid where Day 1 is at the bottom and Day 7 is at the apex, see Figure 1. This is a vertical model. Sign corrupts this model. The top oppresses the bottom: Extinctions of animals, devastation of rainforests, oppression of humans. In order to save creation, and return to Paradise, Christ flips this vertically hierarchical pyramid. He humbles himself, and takes upon the sufferings caused by sin. He tells us in the Gospels that the first will be last, and the last will be first. This is how God operates. God is found at the bottom of the pyramid. We go backward to find our way, and reclaim what was lost. Kind of like in the Hansel and Gretel folk tale, where children find their way back following the morsels they dropped on the way to the wich's house. The new notion of power is in the inverted pyramid. Francis understands the vertical pyramid model of power of his time, but in following Christ, he inverts it. He is the humble

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poor man at the bottom. His Order is the Friar Minor, the lesser brothers. He understands how God operates.

In the incarnation, God could have chosen to be born in a royal palace, but he chose to be born in a stable and was placed in a manger the animals eat from. This shows us the ultimate humility of God (*Phil 2:6-8*). He is the suffering servant, in whom we have our faith and salvation.

Fr. Michael W. Blastic, OFM

Distinguished Visiting Professor of Franciscan Studies Franciscan School of Theology

Father Mike's scholarship and service as a Franciscan have been dedicated to the study and teaching the early Franciscan tradition. He has taught at the Washington Theological Union in Washington DC, The Franciscan Institute at St. Bonaventure University in Olean, New York, and at Siena College near Albany, New York. He spent ten years in Novitiate Formation, most recently at the Old Mission Santa Barbara at the Novitiate for the US-6 OFM provinces. He has done workshops and retreats for Franciscan groups and communities in India, Africa, Australia, the Philippines, and across North America. His publications have attempted to critically study early Franciscan sources as a resource for Franciscan life and ministry today.


