




Minister's Note for October

As October approaches, we move into this very special time for Franciscans: Transitus and the Feast of St. Francis. David York OFM, one of our beloved former Ministers once said, that for Secular Franciscans, it's Christmas, Easter, and Transitus! Transitus and the Feast of St. Francis are poignant for us as Franciscans. You are invited to commemorate the Transitus of St. Francis to eternal life on Tuesday, October 3rd at 7pm in the Mission San Luis Rey historic church. Join us for a reflective, prayerful evening to remember and to pray. A reception featuring almond cookies (of course!) to follow.

Fr. Franklin Fong OFM, shared some thoughts with our Fraternity on Transitus a few years ago. One was so simple but touching. He asked us to look at what we knew of the last moments of Francis's life and what might we learn? Francis asks his dear friend, 'Brother' Jacoba to bring with her some of his favorite dessert — almond cookies! We have carefully recorded that even on his *death bed* he wanted to be joyfully enjoying his earthly life. He wanted to be surrounded by his brothers and also his friend, Lady Jacoba. He wanted to die in the poverty he embraced in his life. We can do well to embrace this Transitus and just quietly reflect on the meaning that unfolds for us.

Fr. Franklin said that this sort of reflection is necessary in our lives as Franciscans; it will take years if not decades of our lives for each of us to pull this all together. Fr. Franklin encourages us to take some moments of private prayer to recall all the different ways and times of how we each learned to show God's love as a Secular Franciscan. To reflect more on how we learned how to enter into a particular ministry more deeply and most importantly how we now understand our ministry after many years or decades. Finally, he asks us to reflect on what lessons in your life we have learned only because we are blessed with being in a Secular Franciscan fraternity.

Professor Martín Carbajo Núñez, OFM

Greetings, All!

I would like to introduce you to a friend of mine, Fr Martin Carbajo, OFM. Some of you may have met him previously when he spoke to us on The Spirituality of Laudato Si. For those of you who have not had the pleasure of knowing Fr Martin, you're in for a treat as he will speaking to us again in November at our regular Fraternity gathering.

I first met Fr Martin during a visit to St Elizabeth's in Oakland many years ago. When I found out he was from Spain, I promised I would cook some Paella for him when he came down to FST. The first recipe I read called for rabbit. I was totally horrified! It doesn't make sense that I'm okay with chicken and not okay with rabbit, but I don't have to make sense all the time! The Paella was a hit!

Fr Martin is a scholar and author par excellence! More importantly, he is a true son of St Francis, dedicated and humble. He has written more books than I can count, many of them translated to other languages. He is also a popular conference speaker and often presents internationally. His latest book, hot off the press, celebrates the 800th anniversary of Greccio. It's called *Celebrating Life: The Rule and Christmas at Greccio.* Fr Martin will speak to us about Greccio in November.

Born in Zamora, Spain, Martín Carbajo Núñez, OFM has lived in Rome since 1995, where he currently teaches ethics and communication at two universities: the Antonianum (Pontifical University Antonianum or PUA) and the Alfonsianum (Pontifical Lateran University or PUL). At the PUA, he has served as Vice-Rector and Rector *Magnificus ad interim* for three years. He also teaches regularly in Spain and the USA. Professor Carbajo studies the relevance of the Franciscan Intellectual Tradition in formulating a global ethic and facing the challenges of the new digital age. He also studies journalistic deontology in regard to informational privacy. How I Became a Franciscan



As a young boy growing up in Sharon, Pa (W Pa), our family attended an old but beautiful Church of the Sacred Heart built in 1866. My mother and father were divorced when I was about 5 years old, and my brother and I lived with our Italian grandparents. After the divorce, my sister went to live with my mother on the Croatian side of the family. My grandparents made sure we attended weekly mass and received the sacraments. During my young years, I had the thought of becoming a priest and this thought stayed in my mind for many years. I was 16 when my father passed away at a young age of 39. I discussed the thought of becoming a priest with my father's sister of whom I was very close. I was told that if I really wanted to become a priest then I would have to go to all the masses on Sundays to determine if this was right for me. However, this did not seem good for me, so I did not do it. While in high school, I met a

girl who belonged to the same Sacred Heart Parish as I did. Once we started dating, the thought of becoming a priest kind of disappeared from my mind and, in 1964, were married four years after high school while Vatican II was going on.

I began going to college while starting a career in the automotive industry. We were married at the age of 21 and were blessed with four children by the time we were 29. All the time, off and on, I still had thoughts of one day serving in the church in some capacity. Years later at the age of 57, I attended a two-day seminar at St Patrick's Church in Carlsbad about becoming a deacon. I became very interested and was told it would take 4 years of study and, by that time, would be about 61 and told I would be too old to become a deacon.

Years later, I had some friends at St Thomas More Church in Oceanside. After I retired from the car business, I was caring for a retired priest and driving him to daily mass. One morning while in the office looking at the information rack, I found a brochure about the Secular Franciscan Order, and it piqued my interest. Inside the brochure were the names of Ed and Barbara Upson who, I found out later, were on the council and the treasurers of the fraternity. I met them one morning after mass and began asking them about the fraternity. I did not act right away, but over a period of short period of time, Ed and Barbara asked me if I had any questions and encouraged me to a "come and see" and attend a session at the mission. I had been feeling a "nudge" to investigate the Order. I then met David York who was the Minister and Sandy Baden the Formation Director. They helped me seal the deal and now, nearly seven years later, I have been elected to the council and the Vice-Minister of the fraternity. In studying and learning about St Francis and St Clare, I have learned, and continue to learn, that Profession is not the end of Formation and is ongoing. The Mission San Luis Rey Secular Franciscan Order fraternity has more than fulfilled my longing to be a closer part of the One Holy and Apostolic Catholic Church.

Prudence A. Hrisanthopoulos - Autobiography



On September 1, 1941, Prudence Ann DiMartino was born of Guiseppe DiMartino of Palermo, Italy and Frances M. DiMartino of Norton, Massachusetts. The first of three children, followed by sister Charlotte and brother Joseph.

I grew up in Pawtucket, RI and attended St. Mary's School through 9th grade, taught by the Sisters of Mercy. I attended West Senior High School. During these years, I was very active and competitive, earning many honors. I was a member of the church choir, a Brownie, a Girl Scout, President of the CYO and a member of the Legion of Mary. I won gold and silver medals from the State Science Fair at Brown University. My essay on Interracial Justice won 1st prize in the State of Rhode Island Essay Contest. My medal was presented by Bishop Russell J. McVinney

in a televised Mass, followed by a reception at the Martin DePorres Center.

At 16, I worked as a clerk for an ad agency weekday evenings. Weekends, I was a counter clerk for a dry cleaning business.

Each day began with Mass, followed by classes, extracurricular activities, the job and then homework. Long, eventful days! After graduating at 17, I began working full-time as a secretary at a road and bridge construction firm in Providence at the onset of The Interstate Highway Program. During my employment, I attended evening classes at Hubbard Business School, graduating in 1961 with high honors.

At 22, I became engaged to a tall, handsome law student who impressed me with his kindness. Just prior to our wedding, we were in an auto accident and Alex was severely injured. The day after he was discharged from the hospital, on July 4,1964, we were married. Our son Andrew was born 3 years later. In the twenty-four years that followed, my life with Alex was very loving; the stresses were all due to the accident's residual effects on my husband's health.

At the construction company, I became Executive Secretary to the President. My 38-year tenure there ended when the company was sold. Afterward, I worked for the Town of Seekonk, Massachusetts as Secretary to the Planning Board and to the Zoning Board of Appeals. This at a time when large chain stores gradually replaced small contractors.

I was professed as a Secular Franciscan in June, 1990 at the newly established St. Clare of Assisi Fraternity in Providence, and immediately became Secretary.

With my work career winding down, I moved to Oceanside in 2004 to be close to my son and his beautiful family. I have a lovely granddaughter, Victoria, and two remarkable grandsons, Alex and Sebastian. My house is in Emerald Lake Village, and I'm a parishioner at St. Patrick's Church. I was able to transfer as a Secular Franciscan to the San Luis Rey Fraternity at the Mission. There I have been active on the Outreach Team, calling and visiting older Secular members.

Over the course of 82 years, I've reached out to others through hospitality, teaching CCD, and aiding those less able. What life has taught me is **GOD IS GOOD – ALL THE TIME!!**

The Outreach Ministry

The long, loving arm of this Franciscan Family

Once professed, we are Franciscans for life. For most of us, this means we'll be Franciscans through our old age.

Typically, elderly Franciscans live with a spouse, other family members, or a house mate. These members have someone to assist them - or to summon assistance – should they fall ill. Though **Outreach** may visit or call them, those with home support are not our main focus.

Outreach was designed to serve those we unexpectedly don't hear from. These elderly Franciscans are single and living alone or in a care facility. When these members miss several meetings, it's too easy for them to be "out of sight" and then "out of mind."

Sometimes, we don't know that a Sister or Brother is suddenly not walking or unable to drive. Their change in health status makes them vulnerable – physically and emotionally – and they may feel overwhelmed. In a short time, they can be in and out of hospital, at a rehab facility and transitioning to assisted living. With so much going on, they often don't call to let us know where they are, how they are, and what they are living through.

Unless we follow up, it is easy to lose touch with a Sister or Brother in transition, which often involves an address change and a new phone number. <u>If we have information on who to contact</u>, **Outreach** will soon be asking them, "Where is our Franciscan?"

This Fraternity's **Outreach** team has visited, called and journeyed with our Brothers and Sisters since the ministry's inception in 2012.

The purpose of the **Outreach Ministry** is to safeguard the well-being of our isolated elderly members, whether at home or in a facility. Specifically, we take care --

- 1) To bring the Fraternity to the member when they cannot come to us;
- 2) To see that their needs are being met, that they live in a clean and supportive environment;
- 3) To ask what we can do for them to provide whatever they need or would like.
- 4) To check they have access to the Sacraments on a regular, ongoing basis.
- 5) To introduce ourselves to caregivers, show interest as a way to know our Sister or Brother is kindly treated, and never abused or neglected.
- 6) Be in touch with family, explain our ministry, and keep communication ongoing.
