It's events where the branches of the Franciscan family come together – and when we gather with Seculars from many



## Guest speaker for November - Fr. Martin Carbajo, OFM

Fr. Martin Carbajo joined us for our November Gathering, kicking off our celebration of the 800<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Greccio. Fr. Martin's talk was so compelling that many of us stayed an EXTRA HOUR to hear it all. It was wonderful. A PDF of Fr. Of the many things Fr. Martin shared with us, he said, that 'Next year, we will celebrate the gift of Stigmata, thus completing the celebration of Greccio. By uniting the crib to the Eucharist, Francis showed that the incarnation is inseparable from the paschal mystery. Celano tells us that, in the humble manger at Greccio, Francis contemplates the humanity of Christ and his suffering on the cross. In fact, there is no manger without stigmata, because "being Christian means living in a Paschal manner." Benedict XVI, «General audience» (Dec. 23, 2009).



Fr. Martin also shared that 'Francis continues to repeat to us: "I have done what is mine; may Christ teach you yours" (LMj 14:3). To respond to this challenge, we need a deep faith that can help us see the starry sky in the darkness of night. In a consumerist and hyper-accelerated society, we need to return, metaphorically, to the refuge of Greccio, finding shelter in the rock, and allowing ourselves to

be "wrapped in silence" (AdS 3).'

## Giving Birth to Christ

Back when I was minister of Mount Alverno Fraternity in Redwood City of the Bay Area, some 20 years ago, our fraternity gathering fell on Mother's Day in May. When I arrived, my fraternity brothers and sisters waited me with a Mother's Day card addressed to me from the fraternity and a flower bouquet saying I was like a mother to them. I was stunned, first of all because I never married, I don't have any children (just Godchilds), and I never thought of myself as a mother. They reassured me that I was one, in a spiritual sense. Perhaps they were right.

This small fraternity comprised of only a handful active members (5 or 6) when I joined them after transferring from Delaware to the Bay Area with my job. They were wonderful Franciscans but their numbers were decreasing. I helped out first with formation. Their numbers started to increase and they probably felt "reborn" after a few years and elected me their minister. So what does it mean for a lay person to be a spiritual mother?

St.Francis of Assisi writes so beautifully in his *Letter to the Faithful*:

"All who love the Lord with their whole heart, with their whole soul and mind, with all their virtue (cf. Mk 12:30) and love their neighbors as they do themselves (cf. Mt 22:39), and hold their bodies in hatred with its vices and sins. and receive the Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and bring forth fruits worthy of penance: O how blessed and blest are those men and women, while they do such things and persevere in them, since upon them rests the Spirit of the Lord (cf. Jn 14:23), and they are sons of their Heavenly Father (cf. Mt 5:45), whose works they do, and they are spouses, fathers and mothers of Our

<u>Lord Jesus Christ</u> (cf. Mt 12:50). We are spouses, when by the Holy Spirit the faithful soul is joined with Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are His brothers, when we do the will of the Father who is in Heaven (Mt. 12:50). <u>Mothers, when we carry Him in our heart and body (cf. 1 Cor 6:20) by divine love and a pure and sincere conscience; we give birth to Him by holy work, which should shine upon others as an example (cf. Mt 5:16)."</u>

Never a better time than now, this Advent, while waiting for the Lord's coming at Christmas, to grow in our love for God and our Neighbors, to show our light to others that they may see the Lord in us, and come closer to Him. The world needs Christ more than ever. So let us not hide our light under a bushel. "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in Heaven" (*Matthew 5: 15-16*)

## A Greccio Plenary Indulgence

This year, Catholics will be able to receive a plenary indulgence from Dec. 8, the solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to Feb. 2, 2024, the feast of the Presentation in the Temple of Our Lord Jesus Christ, by praying before a Nativity scene in a Franciscan church. Earlier this year, on the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the faithful gathered at the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi, Italy, to honor the beloved Italian saint and celebrate the <u>800th anniversary</u> of the approval of the Rule of St. Francis (1223) and the creation of the Nativity scene in Greccio. As part of the celebration of this Franciscan Centenary, the <u>Conference of the Franciscan Family</u> asked Pope Francis for the approval of this plenary indulgence.

The conference wrote: "In order to promote the spiritual renewal of the faithful and increase the life of grace, we ask that the faithful receive a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions from 8 December 2023, the solemnity of Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to 2 February 2024, feast of the Presentation in the Temple of Our Lord Jesus Christ, by visiting the churches run by Franciscan families throughout the world and stopping in prayer in front of the Nativity scenes set up there."

The Apostolic Penitentiary welcomed the request, allowing the faithful to receive this indulgence under the usual conditions. Those who are sick or unable to participate physically can obtain the indulgence by offering their sufferings up to the Lord or by "carrying out practices of piety."

#### What is a plenary indulgence?

A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic Church through the merits of Jesus Christ, Mary, and all the saints to remove the temporal punishment due to sin. The indulgence cleanses a person of all temporal punishment due to sin. However, it must always be accompanied by a full detachment from sin.

#### Conditions to receive a plenary indulgence in all cases:

- 1. Detachment from all sin, even venial.
- Sacramental confession, holy Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the pope. Sacramental confession and receiving the Eucharist can happen up to about 20 days before or after the act performed to receive a plenary indulgence.

It is appropriate that Communion and the prayer take place on the same day that the work is completed. One sacramental confession is sufficient for several plenary indulgences. However for each plenary indulgence one wishes to receive, a separate reception of the Eucharist and a separate prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father are required.
