Servant of God Sr Thea Bowman, FSPA

I love discovering new Franciscan saints, or as in the case of Thea Bowman, Franciscans on the path to canonization. I was first introduced to Sr Thea a few years ago when FST had an evening presentation about her life. What came across in that presentation was the passion and dedication and joy and determination of Sr Thea's spirit. I'm hoping to introduce you to her with a brief overview and strong encouragement to get to know her better.

Sr Thea was born in rural Mississippi in 1937, the granddaughter of slaves. Her father was a doctor and her mother a teacher. They sent Thea to a local Catholic school as they valued education and the Catholic school seemed the better choice. At age nine, Thea decided that she wanted to be

a Catholic. That was only the beginning.

Sr Thea experienced the call to religious life, entered the convent at fifteen, and found herself the only African-American in the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration. According to Robert Ellsberg in Blessed Among Us, she had no desire to 'blend in', but believed her identity was a special vocation.

Thea Bowman received several degrees, including a PhD from Catholic University of America. She taught at many levels, ending up as a professor at Viterbo College, Catholic University and Xavier University in New Orleans.

Sr Thea is said to have been a much in demand and spellbinding speaker, who often would burst into a powerful song in the middle of her presentations! Her joy in in valuing cultural differences while proclaiming unity in Christ was spread far and wide. Sr Thea's talk to the USCCB is available online if you would like to hear her speak. Also online are some of her songs. Wow – what a powerful voice!



Sadly, Servant of God, Thea Bowman was diagnosed with an incurable cancer. She continued to travel and speak, even from her wheelchair until her death in 1990. Here are two quotes from her: "Remember who you are and whose you are". "Part of my approach to my illness has been to say I want to choose life. I want to keep going. I want to live fully until I die."

A highly recommended book on her life and work is Thea's Song by Charlene Smith and John Feister. May we all be touched by her Franciscan Joy!

The Blessings of Servant Leadership

Our San Luis Rey OFS fraternity held its council elections last month and I wanted to write about how happy I felt to be part of this process. The volume of fraternity members who stepped forward, accepting the possibility of being chosen for servant leadership, was inspiring. The Holy Spirit was very present, lifting hearts and banishing some of the self doubt which clouds the courage to simply raise one's hand and say "Yes, Lord". By this, I am humbled and grateful for having been given the opportunity to serve as council secretary for this term.

In my adult experience, leaders made the decisions and servants carried them out. As an educator, to be raised up from the level of your colleagues as a department chair was an honor to be aspired to. Competition, ambition, and superiority of intellect, marked a good leader, where the spirit of service was optional for doing the job well. This perceived mindset made accepting leadership positions difficult for me at times, pride always getting the best of me.

Fortunately, Saint Francis had a very practical purpose in choosing servant leaders. He knew that the need for time alone in contemplative prayer and growing spiritually could not be accomplished effectively alone. The brothers needed the physical and emotional support to dedicate, prayerfully, their time solely to God and life in Him. For this, Saint Francis gave the brothers a plan: for every one or two brothers, who required sustained solitude in prayer, two more brothers would act as "mother's", like a support team, to take responsibility for their physical needs. (Whoever has been camping probably understands the wisdom in this!)

By this model, servant leaders are the ones elected to be "mother" in the fraternity for a time, so that the members can be supported in their spiritual growth. Time for prayer, serving the poor, visiting the imprisoned, whatever they, by their gifts, are called to do. Today, with all of our sources of distraction, active spiritual engagement and personal growth can be exhausting so we come together to be refreshed by the service of those whom we elect to lead us. Everyone of us will be called to become

mother and will have different ways of approaching the tasks blessed to us. In this context, "doing the job well" requires us to empty the vessels of our human ambition continually, to allow the Holy Spirit to take charge in our efforts, and lead us all to Christ, the true source of our Franciscan lives.

Francis of Assisi, 1224-1226: A Spirituality of Decline and True Joy
