"Authority"





We hear about the "authority" of our Holy Father, our Pastors, the police and other government officials, but just what is authority? According to The Catechism of the Catholic Church, (CCC 1097) states, "By "authority" one means the quality by virtue of which persons or institutions make laws and give orders to men [and women] and expect obedience from them."

(CCC 1899) states, "The authority required by the moral order derives from God: "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. God there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefor he who resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgement. (Rom. 13:1-2 RSV)

Remember when Jesus was standing before Pilate when Pilate stated, "…Surly you know I have power to release you and I have power to crucify you?' 'You would have no power over me' replied Jesus, 'if it had not been given from above…" (Jn. 19:11 JB). Even Jesus the Son of God respected Pilate's authority over him, as this authority was granted God, and thus submitted to Pilate's commands.

Realizing that all legitimate authority comes from God, leads us to realize that we are mandated to obey all the laws and mandates of our earthly governments and authorities, providing such obedience doesn't lead us to sin against God. Example: abortion is legal, but the government authorities may not force you to abort the child you are carrying, even if that child will cause a monetary burden to the state in the future.

(CCC 1900) States "The duty of obedience requires all to give due honor to authority and to treat those who are charged to exercise it with respect, and, insofar as it is

deserved, with gratitude and good-will. More on "Authority" can be found in the section/chapter of the CCC entitled "Chapter Two, The Human Community" Article 2, Participation in Social Life" In my edition it is on page 515. Read (MK 1: 21-28), the Gospel for the 4th Sunday in Ordinary time, and you will see what caused me to speak on "Authority." [Editor]

Notes from our minister

Love in the Letters of St. Clare

We often speak of St. Francis' conversion experience before the San Damiano crucifix. St. Clare actually spent 42 years in prayer before that same crucifix, noticing and absorbing every detail, until it became a kind of mirror of love for her. In the four letters we have from her to Agnes of Prague, the word *caritas* (love) appears many times. Here are two examples:

The Third Letter to Agnes of Prague (1238)

Indeed, it is now clear that the soul of the faithful person, the most worthy of all creatures because of the grace of God, is greater than heaven itself, since the heavens and the rest of creation cannot contain their Creator; only a faithful soul is His dwelling place and throne, and this only through the **charity** that the wicked lack. (v. 21-22)



The Fourth Letter to Agnes of Prague (1253) Indeed.

in that mirror, blessed poverty, holy humility,

and inexpressible **charity** shine forth as, with the grace of God,

you will be able to contemplate them throughout the entire mirror. (v. 18)

Images teach us a lot - about love, or about other things. What we watch actually forms us. What images do you watch during the day? How do they shape who you are? What is a mirror of love for you?



Love Letters

I wish to share the beautiful love letters from St. Francis of Assisi that resonate across eight centuries to all Secular Franciscans. These letters are the first and second version of the Letters to the Faithful – also known as 'Exhortations.' The first letter has become the Prologue to our Secular Franciscan Rule. The Second Version is longer and calls us to a deeper life of penance. These letters demonstrate the love and concern of St. Francis for our community, the Brothers and Sisters of Penance – today known as the Secular Franciscan Order.



Francis is calling us to a life of love of God. Paragraphs 19 through 32 of the Second Version seem tailor made for Lent – a time of conversion and a time to grow in love. Francis says, 'Let us love God therefore, and adore Him with a pure heart and a pure mind.' Francis beautifully exhorts us to deepen our spiritual lives through the Sacraments, especially Reconciliation and the Eucharist. Francis urges us to be conduits of God's grace for others by performing worthy fruits of penance,

loving our neighbor as ourselves, and acting with mercy. Francis urges us to embrace charity and humility. Francis asks us to fast and abstain from sin and remained lovingly connected to the Church. All of that, in a few very short paragraphs. This document is a love letter, to us – and from Francis urging us to deeply fall in love *with God*.

Francis's love of God and for us shines through this document. Francis speaks from his heart saying, 'I Brother Francis, your little servant, ask and implore you in the love which is God and with the desire to kiss your feet, to receive these words and the other of our Lord Jesus Christ with humility and love, and observe them and put them into practice.' Francis then asks God to bless all the Secular men and women who both hear and live his words.

Ash Wednesday this year is on 2/14 – Valentine's Day. This Lent, please consider prayerfully reading the Second Version of the Letter of Faithful, this love letter from St. Francis to the Secular Franciscan Order. Savor it, let it shape you. Excellent books that contain the letters are noted below; *The Writings of St. Francis of Assisi* by Fr. Kajetan Esser, OFM is on our website www.slr-ofs.org (Go to 'Resources' => 'Books, Lectures, & Audio', scroll down to the first entry under 'Recommended Reading'). The Letter to the Faithful starts on page 40 of the Esser PDF. This Lent, you may even want to join Franciscans globally praying at the tomb of Francis via live webcam here.
