

Minister's Note



In his Easter Sunday homily on April 12th, Bishop McElroy spoke of this Easter of unlike any other. He said that despite the shadows that surround us, we are also full of hope. It is the resurrection of Christ that provides the greatest hope, the strongest hope. Christian hope is not the belief that everything always comes our right... that is optimism. Optimism is about tomorrow. Christian hope is about today. Christian hope is understanding that during these hard times, God embraces us. This Easter of all Easters... it is a time of hope.

We are called, in this time of uncertainty and chaos to be filled with Christian hope. To be surrounded by this hope, to be in the 'bubble' of hope. Sandy has created a beautiful reflection on living 'In a World of Chaos' in the form of a poem. Her poem is attached to this edition of The Cord. Please take a moment with it and reflect on it.

In this month of May, we especially celebrate our Blessed Mother and the hope we receive from her. Did you know that one of the titles of our Blessed Mother is 'Our Lady of Hope?' In 1871 Mary appeared to children in Pontmain, France, which was facing invasion of war. Mary encouraged the people to pray and have hope. The war ended the next day and did not reach the village. Since then, Mary already recognized under the title of Our Lady of Hope, has been associated with this vision. From the Novena to Our Lady of Hope comes this beautiful prayer: I am the mother of fair love, and of fear, and of knowledge, and of holy hope. In me is all grace of the way and of the truth; in me is all hope of life and of virtue. Come to me all that desire me and be filled with my fruits (Sirach 24: 24-26). O Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Grace, Hope of the world. Hear us, your children, who cry to you.



PADRE PIO

In Rome, June 16, 2002 Pope John Paul II canonized a new Saint, Padre Pio. I first came to learn of this Priest in 1971 when I was converting to the Catholic faith. I was shown a picture of Padre Pio and thought what a peaceful man he seemed to be and wanted to learn more.



Padre Pio was born May 25, 1887, died September 1968, and was an Italian friar, priest, stigmatist, mystic, and now a saint in the Catholic Church. He was known for the Stigmata, healing, Apparitions, Transverberation and Prophecy. I have learned to love this Saint and with my devotion to St. Francis of Assisi.

Our Blessed Mother so loved Padre Pio as she began to appear to him when he was just a child. Padre Pio grew up thinking it was natural that Mary appeared to everyone until he had casually mentioned speaking about Mary to someone and came to learn his experiences were unusual. The life of this painting is a stunning example of an inspiration of turning a creation into an inspiration. While the artist may have seen The Madonna, the public envisioned an image of the vulnerability of a childmother and her infant son. It is, to me, a daily tranquil painting of peace and hope. Though we may never be a Fr. Kolbe or Fr. Pico, may we find the image of beauty in all life.



I remember this picture hanging in our room at my grandmother's house when I was a little child, and always thought it was Our Lady and Baby Jesus. Now that I know the content of the picture, it means even more to me as my sister and I spent a lot of time together as children. My sister was/is 6 & ½ years older than I. EDITOR.

St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe, O.F.M. Conventual (1894 - 1941)

In this traditional Marian month of May, if I asked most Catholics/Franciscans who they might name as a great Marian saint, I doubt most would reply, St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe. If they were familiar at all, they would connect him with being the martyr saint of Auschwitz who offered to die in the place of a stranger. There is so much more to know about our Brother Max that I have loved for many years.

His connection to Mary started at age twelve when in a vision Mary offered young Raymond (Max) a choice of two crowns in his life. The white crown was for a life of purity and the red one was for martyrdom. He asked of her and received both in his life.



Early in his career as a priest, he organized an association in the Church, called the Militia of the Immaculate which is still active internationally today. He was an amazing intellectual (two PhD's by his mid-20's) was a writer and interested in the newest technology available at that time. He almost did not become a priest, as he wanted to serve his country in the military. When he was professed, he took the name of Mary.

He wanted to use his energies to defend the faith through the intercession of Our Lady. The Freemasons were actively attacking the Church and Pope at that time. He attracted an army of young men to the religious brotherhood that he hoped would be knights to conquer the world for the Immaculate Mother.

The friary he opened outside Warsaw at the time was the largest in the world. He named it Niepokalanow, meaning 'Marytown.' He began publishing a monthly periodical named Knight of the Immaculate. He also opened a private radio station for evangelization and opened a second Marytown in Nagasaki, Japan. He hoped that eventually every country would have a Marytown. He even sent two brothers to flight training to expedite circulation of his publication. These are his words, "If Jesus or St. Francis was alive now, they would use modern technology to reach the people." In 1939 war came to Poland and everything changed. Eventually Kolbe and other priests were sent to Auschwitz. This was where he met his martyrdom in offering to take the place of another prisoner in the starvation bunker. That prisoner was at Kolbe's canonization by JPII in 1982. He lived to be 95. On a personal note, I was humbled to visit Auschwitz in 2016. I could not enter the bunker where he was martyred so I pressed my hands on the rough brick exterior and thanked God for this beautiful Franciscan brother. It was an honor to be there.

As we continue the current war on the Coronavirus, let us ask for the intercession of St. Max and Our Immaculate Mother in continuing to bring souls to Christ. As we continue to use the technology of our time, I'm certain we are making Kolbe happy. I recommend you use the following for a beautiful video to learn more. It is only 30 minutes long but extremely well done from the National Shrine of Saint Maximilian Kolbe at Marytown in Libertyville, IL. The video is here. You won't be disappointed!

How to Survive the "Long Haul" of Physical Separation

"We're in it for the long haul." What does that mean? How long IS the long haul, anyway? As we continue our journey in physical separation, it may be important for us



to let go of the desire to know *when* this will end. We really don't know. But letting go of that desire to know can be difficult. Simply not thinking about something *is* difficult! Try it: Do not think about an elephant right now. What are you thinking about? If you are not thinking about an elephant, you may have substituted a different thought (for example, the thought of a puppy) for the thought of an elephant. Similarly, we can substitute thinking about the present for thinking about the unknown future. One way to stay present-focused is to engage in

mindful activities. I recently heard that at least one of our members is knitting or crocheting for others while in quarantine. What a great way to stay focused on the present – one stitch at a time! What other ways can each of us find to remain present-minded?

Another tip for getting through this time is reframing. We remember the old story of Pollyanna, who played the "Glad Game," in which she reframed every difficult situation into one of opportunity and joy. Although this game annoyed her aunt, it was a very effective coping mechanism for Pollyanna, who was able to thus manage both great losses and small inconveniences without becoming depressed. In recent times, many of

us have seen the reframing of the term, "stuck at home" to "safe at home." This simple example illustrates the power of perspective. How we frame something influences how we feel about it. Just for today, how can we play our own Glad Game? **f**Finally, it can be very helpful to talk to others.

Connecting via phone, text, email, or social media brings great comfort. Praying with and for each other unites us in spirit. Although physically separated, we are all in this together.





Holy Gospel for Forth Sunday of Easter

Gospel JOHN 10:1-10

Jesus said:

"Amen, amen, I say to you,

whoever does not enter a sheepfold through the gate

but climbs over elsewhere is a thief and a robber.

But whoever enters through the gate is the shepherd of the sheep.

The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice,

as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out.

When he has driven out all his own,

he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him,

because they recognize his voice.

But they will not follow a stranger;

they will run away from him,

because they do not recognize the voice of strangers."

Although Jesus used this figure of speech,

the Pharisees did not realize what he was trying to tell them.

So Jesus said again, "Amen, amen, I say to you,

I am the gate for the sheep.

All who came before me are thieves and robbers.

but the sheep did not listen to them.

I am the gate.

Whoever enters through me will be saved,

and will come in and go out and find pasture.

A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy;


I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

Commentary: Theme, The Good Shepherd

At many moments of our lives, especially when we have to put up with suffering and unexpected problems, we feel that we are not self-sufficient. In such cases, modern people go to a psychiatrist, a marriage counselor, a lawyer for guidance and advice. Where does God visible in Jesus Christ, fit in your schedule? God's advice and wisdom is available in the words of the Lord Jesus.

The writers of the New Testament were concerned to bring out who the risen Lord is and how we are related to him. This Sunday, we are invited to see the Lord as both the gate or a sheepfold, through which we should enter in security, and our Shepherd, whom we should follow. Though sheep and shepherds are not part of the contemporary American scene and we know them perhaps only from television, with a little goodwill we can understand what the inspired writer wants to say.

By prayerfully reading the Bible and diligently following the Lord Jesus who is "the shepherd and guardian of our souls" (Second Reading), modern Christians know how to integrate the guidelines of their religion whit whatever science offers them for the solutions of their problems! 


