Conference of Regional Spiritual Assistants

Our annual Chapter – the gathering of all of the regional ministers or their delegates – is over, as is Congress, and it's time to assess what we've received and what we've achieved, and what we have yet to work on. This year brought national visitors, for a fraternal and a pastoral visit. Here I'm going to focus only on the pastoral visit, by Fr. Jerome Wolbert, OFM.

There apparently were some complaints voiced by some of the ministers in their closed meeting with the visitors, about their interactions with their spiritual assistants. As you know, all Seculars who are appointed as local spiritual assistants have completed the training course run by the Region over the past 15 years. However, that does not make anyone a perfect person! Unfortunately, none of us can claim such a status. What it has accomplished is to make the appointed spiritual assistants knowledgeable about the processes involved in our lives as Franciscans, including "administrative" things such as elections and fraternal and pastoral visits to local fraternities. In the course of the training, the individual spirituality of those eventually appointed as spiritual assistants has also grown tremendously.

If, however, a council experiences difficulty within their fraternity involved with their relationship with a spiritual assistant, then the council has an *obligation* to take steps to remedy that difficulty. The first thing that should be done is to speak directly with your local spiritual assistant. Oftentimes the difficulty is simply a difference in how we communicate with one another. A spiritual assistant is there to assist, not to direct, or command, or take charge. If the difficulty can't be worked out with your spiritual assistant, then contact the Conference of Regional Spiritual Assistants and see if it can be solved at that level. So that you know, spiritual assistants have been removed, replaced, taken from one fraternity and placed in another, and various other solutions. It is important that the council, in particular, have a good, open, trusting and working relationship with their spiritual assistant. Without that, there is little benefit in having the spiritual assistant there. There must be a good "fit" between the spiritual assistant and the local fraternity. If there isn't, then that assistant will be of little value or help to the council and, ultimately, to the fraternity. To a large extent that depends on personalities and how each communicates with the other. Sometimes we have found that there simply is not a good "fit" with a particular fraternity, and likewise, when the spiritual assistant was moved to another fraternity, the whole situation changed positively.

So please, if you have any problems or difficulties involving your spiritual assistant, discuss it with that person, and/or with the regional spiritual assistants. With openness, frankness, and a spirit of humility on everyone's part, we can get most of these seeming difficulties resolved, all for the benefit of our goals of living better Franciscan lives.

J.P.I.C: Gospel to Life, Life to Gospel

Chapter Two: Article 4

The rule and life of the Secular Franciscan is this: to observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the example of Saint Francis of Assisi, who made Christ the inspiration and the center of his life with God and people.

Christ, the gift of the Father's love, is the way to him, the truth into which the Holy spirit leads us, and the life which he has come to give abundantly.

Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to the gospel.

Every time I read "gospel to life and life to the gospel,' I imagine St. Francis walking down the hill from Mr. Subasio, where he sat in prayer, contemplation, and careful reading of scripture, to Rivo Torto where he served the lepers, and then back up again for more solitary time with our Lord. I have done that walk, dear sisters and brothers, and I can assure you it is not an easy hike. But the walk serves as a powerful metaphor – we are called to sit in quiet prayer and contemplation, reading scripture and letting it form us, and then to take it down the hill to the leper, that is, out into the world to serve those who are in need.

Our Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation work begins in the gospel, and begins as we take the words of our Lord into our hearts and let them form and transform us. Our work, then, is inspired by and sourced by the love which God plants in our hearts and nourishes through scripture, as we go out into the world to serve those in need. Who is in need? We only have to look to Matthew 25 for guidance

"For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me drink, a stranger, and you welcomed me, naked, and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me. Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you? And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."

(The Catholic Bible: New American Bible)

St. Francis read this and ran down the hill to serve our Lord with his life. He calls us to do the same.

Let us encourage and en-hope each other as we move forward with our work for Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation. Let us open our hearts and let scripture give form and shape to the work we do for the Kingdom of God.

FRANCISCAN BOOK GROUP Karron Esmonde, OFS

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Late in 2014, I was in a Rehabilitation Center, recuperating from an encounter with an automobile. In the course of my stay, several of my Franciscan sisters came to cheer me up. My narrow brush with disaster put me in a reflective state of mind, and before long, we were engaged in lively discussion about faith, fellowship, and our life in God's Kingdom.

During one of their visits, I expressed a wish that our discussions might continue after I left Rehab. To my surprise, the suggestion was well received, and we agreed to meet once a month to share our reflections, questions and experiences as Secular Franciscans. As a focus for discussion, we decided to read a spiritual book – something we'd enjoyed or wished to explore with the group. We felt we could realistically read a book a month, and then discuss it at lunch.

My calendar shows the Group first met at my home on January 9th, 2015, and our first book was Ilia Delio's <u>The Humility of God: A Franciscan Perspective</u>. Though some loved it more and others less, we enjoyed discussing what we found surprising, interesting, unsettling and/or puzzling in the pages of Delio's book.

In the course of many discussions – over five years now – these meetings became a space for us to discuss our faith experiences and ministries, our joys and misgivings. We share our victories and find empathy in our suffering. Reading books and swapping stories with friends broadens our horizons; in these discussions we share views and attitudes, deepen our mutual understanding and examine our viewpoints and suppositions.

During our discussions, we share lots of information. Family histories, youthful impressions, careers, travels and pilgrimages – the experiences and surprises, memories and convictions that shaped our lives – fly around the table. We raise questions and share insights, agree and disagree, and share thoughts & concerns about our present ministries. We often get and give advice, supply necessary information and offer referrals.

My Franciscan friends are a bountiful blessing and an amazing resource. I respect and admire each of them for their courage, perseverance, honesty and insight. At once prayerful and thoughtful, they each take time to read the book, dwell on its message, weigh its impact, and then join our meeting with an opinion, a premise, a question – as we huddle over the book at lunch.

I believe every group that comes together in the Spirit brings special graces and blessings to each of its members.

I am very grateful for these Franciscan women in particular: for their bountiful gifts, graces, talents, intelligence, and insight. They are a joy. God has blessed me with these good friends on my journey. I feel His delight as we come together each month, to break bread and be renewed once more in His company.

.Scully Fund Requirements

The Scully Fund has been set up to encourage fraternities in the St. Francis Region to participate in charitable activities. When members of a fraternity take an active role in an apostolic activity and use fraternity funds to purchase materials or supplies for the activity, the fraternity may request to be reimbursed by the Scully Fund for half of those expenses by supplying the following:

A letter detailing the activity, the date it occurred, the number of fraternity members involved, and the amount of expenses incurred.

Receipts for the purchases or a copy of the check(s) used to pay for the items.

A request for reimbursement of half of the expenses.

Send the above information to either the Minister or Treasurer of the region.
